



First day in Grade 1

FROM THE HEAD'S DESK

Dear parents

The theme for my first assembly with the girls from Grades 1 to 7 and the Junior School staff was, admittedly, predictable. I chose to speak about being new, and the experience of newness, mostly owing to the fact that it has been a while since I have felt new at school, or thought about the experience of newness, and how conspicuous and disoriented it can make you feel. People respond differently to change: some, like the Grade 7 girls (whose preoccupation with the odd smell in the Junior School hall made the laying of the new carpet a decidedly qualified success), seem suspicious. Others, like the Grade 1s, are optimistic, gamely denying any discomfort caused by scratchy new uniforms and unyielding shoes.

Also new in the Junior School hall, besides me and a freshly painted portrait of my much-respected predecessor, Des Hugo, were members of staff and girls, who we welcomed with curiosity and genuine warmth. The new girls are: Rachel Smith and Cayla Midlane in Grade 1;

Nobuhle Khumalo in Grade 2; Ella McCormack in Grade 3; Amanda Wilford and Olivia Krige in Grade 4; Muyamari Sambaza in Grade 5; Holly-Rose Brady and Taylor Hagen in Grade 7. We wish them and their families a long and happy association with the school. Some of the new staff appointed by Des were mentioned in her final newsletter; it is my pleasure to introduce those whose names and faces remain unfamiliar to you: Taryn de Winnaar takes over as our head of sport; Lauren Howden is in Grade 1; Mokone Ramulifho is teaching in the Senior Primary; Grace Banda joins us as an intern in the Senior Primary; Rosie Crisafulli joins us a locum in Grade 7; old girls Katie Shepherd and Julia Standish-White are helping out in the Sports and Psychology departments respectively, and Cecile Murray is coaching tennis.

In her last newsletter Des also spoke about the imminent birth of Kerry Gibbons' son, which took place in January: I know you will join me in congratulating Kerry and her family on the arrival of Kayden Tyler. The girls responded most animatedly to the news of staff pregnancies this

I would also like to take the opportunity to congratulate those teachers whose daughters wrote matric last year: the results were uniformly pleasing and the Junior School staff as a whole shares in the accomplishments of the girls, many of whom they nurtured and encouraged early in their school careers.

Finally, it would be remiss of me not to say thank you to the St Mary's community – staff, parents and girls – who have extended a warm and sincere welcome to me over the past few days. A few highlights from my introduction to the school: convincing a Little Saints girl that I was *the* Sarah for whom she was peevishly waiting; showing the discerning Grade Os around my office; falling in step with some Grade 7 girls as they trooped down to the Aquatics Centre for their swimming trials making the kind of frank and light-hearted conversation we hear too rarely among adults; listening to the Senior Primary choir sing at my installation service, as well as

walking from the chapel to the Junior School amphitheatre along a path lined with Grade 3s tethered to bobbing red and white balloons; being greeted in Rosebank on the weekend by a little girl who looked like she was bursting to say so much more than, "Hello." I know the feeling ...

I so enjoyed meeting you all on Tuesday evening at our annual Meet the Teachers event. Thank you for attending this evening.

46 They came to Jericho. And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." 50 So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. 51 Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?"

The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." 52 Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

Lord, as we begin this New Year, please open our eyes so that we can see you, Lord Jesus, in each person around us. Give us a nudge so that we notice and reach out to those on the margins of our perception so that no one feels left out. Remind us, loving Lord, that should we ever feel anxious or at a loss, we need only call to you, and you will answer us and help us.

Please remember to download the St Mary's app.

- The app is available from the Apple App Store and the Google Play Store. Search for it by using "St Mary's School"
- Once you have located it, click "download" or "get icon". When the app has downloaded and been opened, a window will pop up, which requires an access code to be entered. Enter the access code stmary16 and click "OK"
- You will then be taken to the loading screen, and to a screen that will ask about push notifications. Please allow for push notifications to be sent through
- In the menu you will see an icon button that reads "My school profile". Email kathy.mittendorf@stmary.co.za for your unique, personalised access code. This will allow you to bookmark pages, create a personalised schedule and lots more. Remember also to click on "Notification settings" to select the areas of the school that are applicable to you
