FROM THE HEADMISTRESS' DESK

Dear parents

In a recent article on Jane Austen ("Which Jane Austen?" 28 September 2017, *The New York Review of Books*), writer Ruth Bernard Yeazell makes reference to the Bank of England's unveiling of a new £10 note this July to mark the bicentenary of Austen's death: it is only the second image of a woman to appear on British currency - the other, obviously, is of the queen.

Two aspects of the Austen bill resonate with themes raised at the ICP conference Deanne King and I attended in Cape Town last week. Allow me to explain. The bank decided to use a prettified image of Austen created by her nephew, as well as a quotation from *Pride and Prejudice* (1813) - "I declare after all there is no enjoyment like reading!" - that, in Yeazell's words, "is actually spoken by one of the novel's snobs, Caroline Bingley, as she yawns and flings aside a book picked up only because it's the second volume of one Darcy has chosen. Miss Bingley, in fact has been 'quite as much engaged in watching Mr Darcy's progress through his book, as in reading her own.""

These two choices, the cosmetically pleasing image, the quote taken out of context, capture what I would identify as the less overt themes explored in conference sessions. Firstly, the time for cosmetic change is over. In order to create authentic and sustainable schools, it is imperative that we effect real, considered change, and do not just talk about progressivesounding trends and knee-jerk technological innovation. Secondly, context matters: what was apparent in a number of sessions presented by speakers from across the world was that there is no one solution or magic formula that can be used in every school to address or further questions about curriculum, sustainability and transformation. Even when the founder of the African Leadership Academy, Fred Swaniker, exhorted school principals to "do hard things", he wanted us to understand that the directive can be pursued intentionally only by our first engaging with the particular educational context in which we find ourselves.

Without taking both of these points into serious consideration, we risk spoiling the very initiatives through which we mean to point the school in a promising direction - without, in other words, refusing solutions that sound and look attractive, and being mindful always of our responsibility to maintain a balance of continuity and change, we risk provoking the disappointment that taints potentially significant projects like the £10 note intended to honour a great woman writer. The unrecognisable image and the poor choice of quote sells the vision short by appearing expedient and insensitive: we need to do much better.

On Friday 15 September, with only a week's training, the athletics team had a great start to the season at the first weekly athletics meeting. The results were as follows:



Sleep is often considered to be a waste of time, particularly when it comes to examinations and time needed for studying. Tales abound of the all-night studying. Evidence regarding learning and memory would indicate that sleep is essential for good learning not only during examinations but every day. Many children are diagnosed as having attention deficit disorder, when they may simply have a sleep deficit, as the daytime symptoms look very similar.

Dr Bentley is a medical doctor who has been involved in sleep research and sleep disorders in babies, children, adolescents and adults in South Africa for the past 30 years. She believes that often the sleep of patients is ignored when they complain of problems during the day but the two are closely linked. She gives many talks each year to doctors and the lay public on various topics including the management of insomnia and other sleep disorders.
