### From the chaplain

Sunday 15 May - Pentecost - is a significant day in the life of the Christian community. This day marks 50 days after Easter, when the Holy Spirit was given to the then-small community of Jesus' disciples, empowering them to do the Lord's work (Acts 2). Pentecost is therefore sometimes referred to as the day the "church" began. The Greek word for church, *ekklesia*, means more than the place of worship we attend on Sunday - it is a gathering of people, a community.

We, as St Mary's School, are a Christian community focused on education. Pentecost is a good time to reflect on what it means for us to be a Christian and Anglican school - a value we hold central to our identity. Much thought has already been given to this topic, evidenced in our statement concerning the Christian Identity and Ethos of St Mary's, an excerpt from which can be found on our website and on our St Mary's app. We began our term with Eucharists and services for both girls and staff: an acknowledgement of God as the source of all we have and all we are, and a rededication of ourselves to God.

An important part of our acknowledgement, that we are but custodians of the privileges God has given us, is a consideration of our

responsibility to our context. Thus, as has been communicated via the St Mary's app, all chapel collections this term will go toward our social responsibility education initiatives: specifically, toward Waverley Girls' High School and the Saturday School High Schools' programme. Reminders will be given to this effect throughout the term to help us prioritise our responsibility in this regard.

This term, let us consciously take time out each week to rest in God's presence and to reflect on the nature of God, and our relationship with God and with one another. By doing so, we acknowledge that we are not God, and neither do we worship the seemingly irrepressible god of "more": more wealth, more achievements, more material belongings, more fame. The Psalmist reminds us that "unless the Lord builds the house, those who built it labour in vain. Unless the Lord guards the city, the guard keeps watch in vain. It is in vain that you rise up early and go late to rest, eating the bread of anxious toil: for he gives sleep to his beloved." (Psalm 127:1-2)

### Orange River experience

During the recent April school holidays, a group of adventurous geographers and budding scientists, accompanied by ourselves, went on the ultimate exploration across some of the lesser-known regions of South Africa.

Our adventure commenced in the Mother City, where we were lucky enough to escape the arrival of the recent cold fronts. Gorgeous weather made for amazing sightseeing and geological observations along Chapman's Peak, Cape Point and Table Mountain. Professor Harris of the Geography department at UCT provided us with interesting insights into the Table Mountain rock formations.

From Cape Town our journey took us deep into the Karoo, where we spent a night in the hamlet of Sutherland. Our visit to the observatory and, in particular, SALT, was fascinating. Stargazing in the light-free zones of Sutherland should be on every South African's bucket list.

From Sutherland, we ventured into the red rock zone and rooibos farming area of the Cedarberg. The rooibos tea tasting in Clanwilliam at the Rooibos Teahouse was a most civilised afternoon activity.

From Clanwilliam we travelled into Namibia through the Vioolsdrift border, where we began our Orange River canoe adventure. This was one of the real highlights of the trip. Gentle paddling along the river, with intermittent rapids, made for ultimate fun and relaxation at the same time.

Boiling hot days of over 35°C warranted a regular dip into the river. Complete silence, together with magnificent scenery and isolation, made the experience altogether breathtaking. Sleeping on a river sandbank under the stars is a memory we will cherish forever.

Our homeward bound journey took us via Augrabies National Park, where we narrowly escaped a violent attack by a troop of hungry baboons! Kimberley was our final destination before we arrived home in our overland vehicle - which was our home from home for 12 days!

What a wonderful adventure and a truly special group of girls.





# Rowing

The selection process is rigorous, and being selected is an honour. The next level of competition is the Gauteng squad. The rowers in this squad attempt to qualify for Junior Nationals. If you look at the triangle below, this will explain the pathway to the Olympic Games.



We are extremely proud of our young rowers. Emma and Alexa were selected for the SASRU development team. They competed at the Wallingford and Bedford Regattas in England from 28 April to 9 May. The girls raced well in the U18 event at the Wallingford Regatta, narrowly missing out on making the A final. We commend these girls and are looking forward to watching their progress in the future.

# Netball

St Mary's won one match, drew one and, unfortunately, lost one. This resulted in St Mary's playing in the Plate section.

The Plate section was even more competitive as teams were fighting for the gold medal. The third day of the festival saw St Mary's playing four more matches, against Edenvale, Kingsmead, St Dominic's and Maragon. All matches were won confidently.

The fourth and final day of the festival seemed more challenging than the other three days, as the girl's bodies were tired and sore. Three matches were scheduled, including the finals. The first match was against Uplands and then Pretoria Girls' High School. The first match was lost against Uplands, but we won the second.
