CHAIRPERSON'S ADDRESS

Prizegiving address by Nigel Carman 10 October 2014

To our guest of honour, the Revd Roger Cameron, headmaster of St John's College, and Ann Cameron, Deanne King, head of St Mary's, Des Hugo and the staff of St Mary's, colleagues on the Board of the School, and on the Board of the St Mary's

Foundation, parents, friends, and most especially the girls of St Mary's and the matric class of 2014 - welcome to this assembly of the school in celebration of the year that is drawing to a close and the achievements of many girls who, in one way or another, and in their own terms, have excelled.

It is of course right that we should celebrate excellence by the giving of awards and prizes. But no one should underestimate the very hard choices which the staff are often faced with in deciding to whom prizes should be awarded. So tonight, although some may not receive awards, we celebrate also the involvement and achievements of many, many girls not only in the classroom, but also outside it: in the chapel, in their service to the community, on the sports fields, in the art rooms, in the

music rooms, and on the stage, in all those areas where each girl can demonstrate her own creativity and problem-solving skills, her own individual worth. Every girl, looking inwards and disregarding the noise of others around her, will be able to recognise her own achievements; and recognising them, will be able to be proud of the person she is.

The school is undoubtedly in a very good place. The girls, supported and encouraged by their teachers, continue to excel in the multitude of activities in which they, and their teachers, engage. By all the local and international benchmarks

in which we participate, the standards and results of teaching and learning throughout the school are excellent. In Art, Music and Drama and in the many co-curricular activities in which the girls participate, they achieve wonderfully. And one only has to read Theo Garrun's *Saturday Star* schools supplement to see what is being achieved week after week on the sports fields.

For all of these things, on behalf of the Board and the whole St Mary's community, I congratulate and thank Deanne King and the whole staff.

From the point of view of the Board, we are extremely relieved that our problems with the swimming pool seem to have been solved, and a low-key but delightful reopening ceremony took place earlier this week. We are, and have always been,

very conscious of the disappointment that has been felt by the school community, and the inconvenience that everyone has experienced. We do appreciate the patience and understanding that you have all shown over what has been a very long and trying haul.







We are particularly grateful to two people who bravely stepped well beyond their comfort zones in bringing about this solution: to Deanne King and Maryanne Lansdown, we say a special thanks. The one, a school head and English teacher by training; the other, a school business manager and chartered accountant from a banking and retirement fund administration background. They have borne the brunt of the long, complicated and frequently exasperating process of investigating the engineering and construction problems that beset the pool, finding solutions and then implementing them. This included finding ways to alter the steel structure of the bulkhead, and organising large cranes to remove and replace the bulkhead.

I am also pleased to formally report that we have purchased the property adjoining Little Saints. Apart from the fact that their daughters are Old Girls, Roy and Helen Wiggill have been wonderful neighbours for the school, understanding with patience and, I think, pleasure, over many years, the noise and activity of a busy school on their doorstep, not to mention the AstroTurf lights intruding on their evenings. It seems therefore a fitting acquisition for the school in many ways, and we are grateful to them for giving us the first opportunity to buy their much-loved home.

So what makes a great school? This is the question that confronts the Board as we move into the next stage of our strategic planning process. How do we know when we have been successful? Is it sufficient to have excellent matric and sporting results? Why do we do the things we do - play sport, teach Mathematics, build The Edge, espouse a particular religious ethic? Or is it about the sort of people we help the girls to become when they leave the school? Because it is in answering these sorts of questions, that we must plan the future of the school. The process is under way and we will, in the first term of 2015, engage with the parent body to hear about your views and expectations of the school.





To all my colleagues on the Board, thank you for your support and enthusiasm, and for the diverse special skills and experience that each of you brings to the school. Mr Alan Pullinger, the chief executive officer of RMB and a parent and past parent, has joined the Board this year. I have no doubt that the school will benefit enormously from the knowledge, skills and experience that he will bring, and has already brought, to the business of the Finance committee and of the Board. You are all a pleasure to work with.

To the matrics of 2014:

It is not long before you will have completed your matric exams and will have left the school. You will be presented with many opportunities, and many challenges. You will face difficult choices.

But if you remember the things you have learnt at St Mary's: about faith and spiritual values, about the values of honesty, generosity and compassion, of courage, humility and determination, of self-respect and of respect for others; and that for every privilege, there must be a balancing or competing responsibility, you will take the opportunities, you will meet the challenges and you will make the right choices.

Be proud of who you are. Let the school be proud of you, and what you make of the opportunities and challenges ahead.

HEADMISTRESS' ADDRESS

Prizegiving address by Deanne King 10 October 2014

Revd Roger Cameron, Mrs Cameron, Mr Nigel Carman, Dr Carman, members of the school Board, the Foundation Board, the PTA, Old Girls' Association, staff and teachers of St Mary's, parents, friends, St Mary's girls and the class of 2014.

I thank Roger Cameron for agreeing to address us this evening. He spoke at my installation in 2009, and since then he has been a friend and colleague whom I value and admire. He will retire from St John's College at the end of the year after a remarkable career in education. Welcome, Roger.

Our school's year is captured in print in our newsletters, in the *Distinctions* publication and school yearbook.

These records present the variety and opportunity that the academic and cocurricular programmes offer the girls at St Mary's, and they present the pillars of our faith and community that underpin our school's existence. Many individuals and teams are featured and celebrated throughout the year, and the school routine and dynamic is almost tangible through the text and images. My only

regret is that each individual girl's contribution to the life of St Mary's is not recorded for future generations. In acknowledging success in a competitive environment, we fail to acknowledge everyone and this is surely the most significant shortcoming of a school.

The achievements and activities of 2014 are a continuation of the proud heritage and tradition which our school has built over more than a century. There has been much change over this period, as there should be in education, but there is much

that remains the same. The ethos and spirit of this school endures and a glance through any one of the yearbooks presents a school that has always been strong in its faith, been a meaningful contributor to the wider community, a school with a positive approach to sport and the arts, and one that encourages girls to be happy and confident in their individuality.

I can confidently say that the St Mary's community is committed to our ethos and spirit. From the school Board to the Old Girls, to parents and staff, we all celebrate our school's character and we protect and encourage it vigorously. This stability, however, will always be challenged as the school embraces the need for educational change and the desire to achieve excellence.

Academic success, which is measured in matric results and tertiary admission, and co-curricular success, bring pressure and challenge to our school which could ultimately undermine what is, our ethos and our values of love, integrity and community. We need to guard against this.







Society itself poses certain threats to our character. We live in a world of rampant materialism, instant gratification, where the scramble for the top at any cost conflicts with values and morals. Life is lived at a speed that is incongruent with character development, which requires quiet and reflection. The words of William Wordsworth often play in my head when I search for a description of our daily lifestyle: "The world is too much with us; late and soon, getting and spending, we lay waste our powers: Little we see in Nature that is ours." British sculptor Antony Gormley understands our societal crisis when he says, "Because luxury in the 21st century is really about space, peace and silence."

Not only is our lifestyle fraught but parenting exacerbates the focus on an end result. A St Mary's parent recently shared a blog post on The Huffington Post with me, written by Michelle Rose Gilman, an educator from California, about parents' anxiety and obsession with college admission in the United States of America. Gilman writes, "What I have found in my 25 years in education is that as parents we are almost forced into this artificial race upon birthing our children. We start with our best intentions, of course. We want the best pre-school, the best teachers, and the best summer camps. Slowly, without our being aware of it, we are competing with our neighbours, our friends, our families. What started out as just wanting the best for our children, suddenly morphs into my child needs to be the best." This anxious parenting style strangles children's creativity and leaves them riddled with anxiety. Add to this the challenges of adolescence which include rebellious behaviour, a sense of vulnerability and feelings of loss which accompany the transition from childhood dependence into adulthood. The result is our girls' happiness, resourcefulness, curiosity and independence are under threat, and with this, the school's ethos.

In Notes from a Headmaster's Desk, Marc Falconer, head of King David Linksfield, writes, "It's a matter of getting the balance right: grit with protection, rigour and determination with positive reinforcement and kindness. And a school can only achieve this with parental understanding, investment and support."

Our children need love and care, but they also need firmness and consistency. We, as adults, must be a voice of sanity and wisdom, if we are to guide our children through their schooling. To borrow from Charles Dickens, school can be the best of times and it can be the worst of times. It is an experience of participation, of endeavour, of reward and achievement, but also an experience of disappointment and of failure.

The beautiful process of childhood development and education that is very much part of schooling, is undermined in a world where the outcome is all that matters. Process and learning are easily sacrificed for the race towards an outcome. Thus it is the responsibility of parents and teachers to teach our children to enjoy learning, to find reward in endeavour, and most importantly that failure is a significant aspect of success. Ideas, theories, questions - this is the creativity of learning. It is not about the answer. Academics, theorists and scientists spend their whole lives in the process of searching, learning and looking for answers. My wish for the girls at St Mary's is that they will take pleasure in their education; that they will accept failure as a healthy part of their schooling; that they will find enjoyment in effort and hard work.

Malcolm Gladwell, in his book *David and Goliath*, explores how advantage can sometimes become a disadvantage and that disadvantage is often a powerful advantage. An example of how failure can lead to success is to be found in our own experience at the hockey festival this year. A relatively poor result at the festival inspired a renewed and vigorous effort that led to a highly successful season. Gladwell would acknowledge our season's achievement as a response to misfortune.

St Mary's is blessed with much advantage. It is our responsibility, as custodians, to protect the advantage we have and to develop our school for future generations. We can never be complacent. I want to thank the team that works for the wellbeing of our school: the Board, PTA, Foundation and Old Girls' Association, the administrative staff and support staff who make a significant contribution to the professional and successful character of St Mary's, and the teachers who are the most important



and influential component in this team. My deputies and management committee, it is a privilege for me to be a part of your team and to be a contributor to this school. It is a privilege to be able to lead young women in their learning and formation of character.

Not only do we bid farewell to our Form Vs but there are members of staff who will be leaving St Mary's at the end of the year. Roslyn Wood-Morris and Michelle Mulligan have both made a valuable and meaningful contribution to the girls at St Mary's, and they will be missed. Jenny Sharland and Mandy Bright will leave a gap in the administrative area of our school. I thank these members of staff for their dedicated service to St Mary's.

Form Vs, your education at St Mary's has been as much about developing your character as acquiring knowledge and skills. It has not always been easy; at times it may even have seemed as

if you confronted giants (in the words of Malcolm Gladwell), but you responded and you persevered. That is your achievement - that is a worthy foundation. I hope that as you embrace a new chapter in your lives next year, you will continue to value all opportunities to develop your whole self - mind, body and spirit. Shirley Ward left you with sound advice on Wednesday, when she said, "What matters is how you choose to spend your time and how you treat other people."

At Old Girls' Day we sang *In the Morning of My Life* together, the words of which are a reminder that we are responsible for how we choose to live our lives. *And the question I shall ask only I can answer. Was I brave and strong and true? Did I fill the world with love my whole life through?*

HEAD GIRL'S ADDRESS

Prizegiving address by Jessica Morris 10 October 2014

It is a place where we can express ourselves, a place where we feel safe, a place we can call home and a place where we are a part of the St Mary's family. This St Mary's family has such a tight and special bond and love, which can only be understood by the people within the community.

This bond is formed by the variety of members who make up the St Mary's family. Ms King, even though your surname is King, you have really been the queen of our school, and you have guided us with a firm and gentle hand. Who will forget the two craziest women in the school who are our two ancestral gogos, Ms Howell and Ms Quix? You both make all the Doris' in the school laugh with your inspiring stories such as: "It's not how you start but how you finish"; "It's not how tired you are, it's how well you cope" and my favourite one, "Don't ask for permission, ask for forgiveness." Then to the mum of the matric class, Ms Murray:



thank you for always fighting for us in the staffroom, listening to our venting sessions, and believing in us. You have supported us from the very beginning, and we hope that we have made you proud.

To the amazing St Mary's teachers, thank you for guiding, supporting and educating us over the past five years. others but thee." Selfies with friends are not selfies, and it is a selfie sin to post a picture in which your friend looks better than you.



I run my blade across the surface. The streaks left in the water slowly retreat from my blade, swimming into the distance towards the far bank. I begin to row and I watch as my blades make little puddles that are shaped like mushrooms where the water swirls and turns. With each stroke, two trails of mushrooms begin to develop on either side of my boat across the surface of the water. I giggle with excitement and I feel like Hansel leaving a trail of puddles to the centre of the dam.

As my boat drifts across the water, I glance around me. The grass and trees wiggle in the sunlight, soaking up all the warmth of the summer's day. A sweet breeze blows off the reflective water and I am captivated, for the first time, by the beauty of Roodeplaat Dam. The buoys that bob in rows, demarcating the lanes, resemble the opportunities for success that I will have and they dare me to take on the challenge of rowing. But the dam is also daunting to me. I do not know where I am or how to get back home. The darkness of the deep water beneath me reminds me of the hidden danger of the dam. SHADOW OF THE PAST

Her small, birdlike frame is crumpled in the familiar floral armchair — a wedding present from nearly 80 years ago. Her body is frail, her skin deeply wrinkled, yet her mind is alert as she curiously watches the golfers tee off on the number six hole that runs alongside her Illovo townhouse. She was an excellent golfer and tennis player in her youth.

She remains an avid but diminished gardener. Once she cherished acres of park-like paradise, which included a serious vegetable garden. Now she has a small postage stamp of turf surrounded by her favourite English roses. Thanks to a fragile body, all she can do now is potter around with a hose and do some snipping here and there, but she continues to plant and prune as though she will have many years to enjoy her garden. For her, gardening defies time. In my distant memory is a picture of my great-grandmother as a younger woman vigorously digging, raking, planting and pruning leggy roses to entice future blooms and bursts of colour.

Future? Time has reversed for my 98-year-old great-grandmother. Instead of a vast ocean stretching out expectantly ahead of her, the ocean has slipped behind her. Her view is now the white foamy waves driving towards the shore before they dissipate on the beach. Memories are more important to her now than the present or the future. Although a widow of 30 years, she speaks about her late husband as a shadowy companion who has scarcely left her.

My great-granny vividly recalls the Great Depression and its impact on her family. She was a promising student in matric when her father lost his job as a land surveyor, and she was

forced to get a job to support her three sisters and send them to university. I cannot help thinking that she was my age when she went to work. How would I react if my dreams of university education were suddenly wrenched from me and I was now the breadwinner for my family?

Granny has engaged with grief and loss countless times. She herself is a cancer survivor; she has survived her son and her entire family, and most of her friends. "The last outpost," she calls herself. Yet, granny seems to have found a way through all this tragedy and a will to live after and beyond. Perhaps her hard life as a young woman built the resilience to keep going.

Forever etched in her mind is her beloved brother, Smiler, an 18-year-old fighter pilot whose plane was shot down in World War II. Scarcely older than me, Smiler will always remain the handsome young boy in the photo that stands on her dressing table. "They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them," she reminds me.

In many ways, my great-grandmother is forever young in spirit. She compensates for loss of sight by memorising everyone's phone numbers. She remains interested in the lives of her 13 great-grandchildren and her life is far from sedentary. She attends lectures arranged by the "Darts" club on Mondays; flower club on Thursday; church on Wednesday; she shops daily at Thrupps and watches the latest art films at Rosebank's Cinema Nouveau; she visits show gardens on the weekends and is out for lunch almost every day! We have to make appointments to visit her, as her diary is crammed with dates written in her spidery script. Having tea with granny is always an occasion. Cream scones, real English teacups and a proper teapot are set out on a white tablecloth, not the rushed gulping of tea in mugs that we have at home. She regularly takes meals to her "poor old" friends, most of whom are 20 years younger than her! I have seen through my greatgrandmother that this last phase of life is not necessarily nonlife, just a new stage of life, so long as one remains interested in people, has a purpose for each day and remains reasonably active. Her body and mind may be diminished, but the person she was still remains within. If I am blessed with a long life, this is how I would like to age.

Yet eternal youth is a fantasy. Two weeks ago my great-grandmother ventured out with her 100-year-old friend, without helpers, to inspect the renovations to their favourite club. Neither are robust or nimble on their feet, but both are rebels at heart and fiercely independent. Inevitably, my great-grandmother tripped on some rubble and broke her elbow. "Does it really matter at this stage?" she enquired of the doctor. "I'm really not planning a great expedition in the near future."

This may be so, but I do wonder what she'll manage to cram into the next two years before her centenary.

We filter our circumstances and past experiences through our senses, and what we see, touch, taste, smell and hear are the conduits for our unique emotional and intellectual engagement.

Einstein feared the day that technology surpassed human interaction and created a generation of idiots but that said, a rather handy website, Quote Investigator, claims he was misrepresented by

disgruntled individuals bemoaning cellphone etiquette. #we live in interesting times.

The conundrum is whether to take advantage of technology or return to faith in the unknown and unknowable. The play looked towards a utopia that embraces both: a world that trusts in our humanity and engages our spirit — enhanced by technological progress. It reminded us to enjoy life and the world around us.

Colette de la Rey had this to say about the play: "What a stretch — of the imagination, of the boundaries of our suburban mindset, of our experience of theatre and of our world view."

Alexandra Short (alto saxophone) joined us later. Susan Gardner has swopped from bass clarinet to alto saxophone, Fiona Roxburgh is making her mark in the trumpet section and the new saxophone section is making waves.

During the year, the band fine-tuned repertoire and developed sight-reading and improvisation skills. Eight of the girls spent six inspirational days at the Standard Bank National Youth Jazz Festival in Grahamstown, part of the Standard Bank National Arts Festival. Workshops were facilitated by local and international jazz musicians and teachers, and Wayne Purchase, according to Karien Scribante, was "a bit of a hit". Their performances were conducted by

some of South Africa's foremost performers and jazz educators. They attended concerts that showcased national and international jazz musicians, including composer, arranger and conductor Maria Schneider, a multiple Grammy Awardwinner. Once, her band practised under an oak tree and our girls assisted with page turning and preventing music scores from being lost to the wind. Robyn Murning was selected as the lead trumpeter for the National Schools' B Big Band. It was exciting to see Old Girl Hlumelo Ledwaba (2012), performing with the National Jazz Vocal Ensemble on the last evening of the festival. Hlumelo, in her second year of jazz studies at the University of Witwatersrand, has featured on the bill of The Orbit, Johannesburg's hottest jazz venue.





FORM II WILDERNESS SCHOOL AT MARETLWANE

Wilderness School is an experience that encourages curiosity, and allows for learning about self through reflection and personal physical endeavour. Our pupils live in a world in which the challenges are complex and multi-dimensional, and require them to be talented problem-solvers, clear and articulate thinkers, caring and skilful in engaging with people different from themselves, and capable of resisting conformity and self-interest. The success of the 2013 pilot programme allowed Wilderness School to become an exciting, and firmly entrenched, addition to the extended curriculum at St Mary's in 2014

Many of the Form IIs' initial expectations and thoughts of Wilderness School were of dirt, dust, hardship and awful camp food. Upon final reflection, two weeks later, the girls' experiences showed otherwise. The highlight of the camp for a large number of girls was the mastery of cooking skills and their new-found passion in life thanks to Ms K, Maretlwane's dedicated chef. In the evenings each cluster of girls was responsible for preparing and cooking their own meals, which on occasion involved making their own fire. 

The U14s convincingly beat St Peter's 13-1 in their first game. This was just the start of their amazing season, and they also beat Kingsmead College 10-1. The U15s also played exceptionally well this season. The A team beat Kingsmead College 16-0 and St Peter's 7-1. The U15 B team did not have many matches, as few schools have enough players for two teams, but they did play Roedean School and won 6-4. JUNIOR SCHOOL HEADMISTRESS' ADDRESS

Celebration evening by Des Hugo 24 November 2014

Good evening and welcome. A special welcome to our chairman of the Board, Nigel Carman, members of the Board, members of the Foundation Board, Deanne King,

staff, parents, visitors and girls.

The world mourned the passing of the founder of our Rainbow Nation, Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela, our very own Madiba, when the 95-year-old former statesman passed away almost one year ago, on Thursday, 5 December 2013. Through his fierce dignity and unbending will to sacrifice his own freedom for the freedom of others, Madiba transformed South Africa and moved all of us. His commitment to transfer power and reconcile with those who jailed him set an example that all humanity should aspire to, whether in the lives of nations or our own personal lives. And the fact that he did it all with grace and good humour, and an ability to acknowledge his own imperfections, makes Madiba that much more remarkable. We should not forget

the values that Madiba stood for and sacrificed his life for. He stood for freedom, and he fought against those who oppressed others. He preached and practised reconciliation. It is important for South Africans to relive the values of unity, reconciliation and compassion so that we create a better South Africa. Through all that he endured, he learned not to hate. Instead, he chose to see goodness in every person.

Our country and the world watched the news of his passing. Thousands of us walked to his home to pay our last respects, and when his son was asked what happens next, his reply was: "What happens next is that we pick up from where he left off." The

greatest tribute we can make to Mr Mandela is to live like him. He showed us tolerance and generosity, kindness and care. This

year at school, we have been considering these values.

Quotations from Mr Mandela's journey can be used as important lessons towards a fulfilled life. I am going to add some as we reflect on our year, and review whether we have stood true to the pillars of our school. The pillars — spiritual, academic, service, cultural and sporting, underpinned by our values of love, integrity and community — remain our endeavour.

Religion and prayer are great forces and can help one have command of one's own morality, one's own behaviour and one's own attitude. Religious institutions need to continue to be the conscience of society, a moral custodian and a fearless champion for the weak and downtrodden.

Prayer is a central part of our day, as we start with class prayer or chapel and pause at midday as the Angelus bell sounds, to offer a prayer. Our Eucharist, admission to Communion and Baptism services remind us of our promise to live daily in the work of God. Thank you, Revd Gill, for our time in chapel, in prayer and in the comfort you provide our community.

"And living isn't just about doing for yourself, but what you do for others as well."

We have acknowledged the Archbishop's Initiative in Education by uplifting our local communities through partnerships.





An education that seeks to uplift and support our fellow citizens is a life-worthy one. The involvement of our girls and teachers with our local schools, and professional learning workshops for ECD teachers from Soweto, Kagiso and Alexandra, thrive. We are exploring opportunities for collaborative support of childcare centres operating within Anglican churches. With the Anglican Board of Education housed at St Mary's from January 2015, under the expert guidance and development of Revd Roger Cameron, this collaboration can be expected to grow.

"As we set about building a new South Africa, one of our highest priorities must be our children. Our actions, policies and the institutions we create should be eloquent with care, respect and love for our children."

Ongoing commitment to a Saturday teacher development programme, and sourcing funds needed to sustain this, is challenging, but the feedback from the practitioners and hearing of their inspiring changes in classrooms and to the lives of the many children in their care, make it all worthwhile. I thank St Mary's for supporting the work our teachers do with care, respect and love for the children in our local townships.

We commenced our year with transformation workshops for the community, facilitated by Thandi Chaane. These difficult but worthwhile conversations strengthen bonds, build our school community and deepen our integrity. As a South African church school we choose to teach our children to love one another and we teach our children to forgive one another.

"No one is born hating another person because of the colour of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite."

No school can assume that one year of success leads to another; ongoing review is essential in our rapidly changing educational landscape. Twenty-first century children learn differently; we need to meet the challenge and reflect annually on whether we are relevant in what we do.

"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world."

Girls, you are offered a great education. Embrace the value your parents place on it and grasp every opportunity available to you at school. Your learning can change the world in your future. Nothing is impossible! The Shared Assessments and International Benchmark Test results affirmed our academic programmes, and the achievements of our girls confirm that the work we do is relevant to future learning. Participation, awards and commendations in the inter-school speech, writing, Maths and Science competitions reward the work of the teachers and girls. But we are not complacent as we prepare children for an unknown future. Our IT and mobile learning strategy has continued the journey needed to move us to the new learning fuelled by technology. Changes gain momentum daily. Our children are wired to manipulate these



changes and they will be one step ahead of us in this field. This has implications for education and parenting; connect with your children on social media platforms to understand their digital personalities and monitor their electronic persona. We teach them to be safe online; parents need to follow this up at home.

"Part of being optimistic is keeping one's head pointed toward the sun, one's feet moving forward. There were many dark moments when my faith in humanity was sorely tested, but I would not and could not give myself up to despair, it would have led to defeat."

Deanne King, in her Prizegiving speech in October, said: "Schooling is an experience of participation, of endeavour, of reward and achievement, but also an experience of disappointment and of failure. The beautiful process of childhood development and education that is very much part of schooling is undermined in a world where the outcome is all that matters. Thus it is the responsibility of parents and teachers to teach our children to enjoy learning, to find reward in endeavour, and most importantly that failure is a significant aspect of success."

"After climbing a great hill, one only finds that there are many more hills to climb."

Our teachers love opportunities to change a race towards achieving outcomes into an exciting journey of skill and knowledge acquisition. The support offered on this journey builds confidence to try and try again. Challenge strengthens endeavour. Taking time to reflect and review and recreate are part of the Junior School's learning strategy, all attributes of a growth mindset which Carol Dweck advocates in her book *Mindset*. The powerful mind of the child is so evident by their open mind and their wonderings!

"It is in the character of growth that we must learn from both pleasant and unpleasant experiences."

I thank our admin and support teams and all the teachers, so ably guided by Robynne Dunkley, Di Gordon and Méabh Gilbert, for their dedication and support. As a team we hope to continue to investigate, inquire and inspire present and future learning. This involves rethinking and interrogating trends to ensure relevant shifts to improve our teaching and learning which is essential for the success of the children.

We celebrate success in sport, not in only in the winning, but in overcoming fear of challenges, and losing. I thank Jane Samson for leading our superb Sports department to ensure we field teams for girls who wish to participate. Successes have been reported in newsletters, in *Distinctions* and in the media. I congratulate the girls and thank their coaches for nurturing a love of and participation in sport, and commend the more than 100 girls selected for provincial and national teams.

We have appointed Carol Shutte, an accomplished musician and excellent teacher, to lead the Junior School music. Fiona Pretorius has not been well and has resigned to regain her strength. Daniel Hutchinson, a talented musician and inspiring teacher, will replace Fiona.

Our Little Saints team continues to be dynamic. Tanja Duganzich is leaving to move to Pridwin and Chantel Jarvis has accepted a deputy head post at St Stithians Junior Prep. I am delighted that Angela Mortimer and Candice Gardner have been appointed to Little Saints. Georgina Harris will be the JP Support teacher.

LITTLE SAINTS

At Little Saints curiosity and creativity are celebrated, from clay work in the atelier, to moving logs in the big garden, to becoming fairies in the fantasy area and climbing trees in the fairy garden, to having your hair done in the Wendy house hair salon, to figuring out a puzzle in the cognitive area. Every moment is a chance for both teachers and learners to wonder and learn. As Loris Malaguzzi, the father of Reggio, said: "Learning (learners) and teaching (teachers) should not stand on opposite banks and just watch the river flow by; instead, they should embark together on a journey down the water."

In 2013, Little Saints created a mosaic to celebrate St Mary's 125th anniversary. The children embarked on tours of the school to find out what makes St Mary's special, and were then asked to express their thoughts in pictures. Something quite remarkable became evident: all had identified five elements that make up the essence of St Mary's — God, beauty, learning, relationships and activities.

Lindsay Gaydon, a St Mary's Old Girl and mosaic artist, supported and advised us throughout the process and after months of work, the children selected from their drawings those they felt most suitable. Parents and children laid the tiles and within three weeks the mosaic, which stands proudly on a wall of the Pitt Block, was complete.

Twenty-fourteen has been a successful year for the St Mary's Foundation's *For Girls* campaign which, despite the difficult economic climate, raised considerable funds. Thanks to the generosity of its donors, the Foundation was able to invest a capital sum as an endowment to support the bursary programme.

A wine auction raised R295 000 for the bursary programme. The evening was a resounding success, thanks to the generosity of those who attended and the estates that donated wine. The programme can now give five young girls from underprivileged households the chance to attend St Mary's.

The annual Foundation dinner was held in collaboration with the House of Mandela and Standard Bank. The St Mary's Foundation is focused on ensuring, through the sustainability of St Mary's and its significant resources in infrastructure and expertise, an exceptional education for the girls of Johannesburg and of South Africa.

Our aim is to leverage those resources to:

- Give deserving but financially constrained girls an opportunity
- Recognise and foster excellence in the highest achievers
- Develop and enhance teaching skills
- Ensure that learners at the schools that surround us can benefit also from these remarkable resources

We have set ourselves ambitious financial targets and after a number of years of groundwork, the Foundation has, this year, gained some significant traction.

This is largely as a result of two very generous donations, one by the Davidson family whose twins Abby and Jaime matriculated some years ago, and one a grant to the Foundation by the Colley Education Trust, a trust set up by the family of Elda Furness, who was head girl of St Mary's in 1948.

When that trust was wound up recently, St Mary's was selected as one of the beneficiaries of the capital of the trust, both because of the association that Elda had had with the school and because of the reputation that the school currently enjoys under the present leadership.

It is immensely gratifying that the experiences of a schoolgirl many decades ago and the current successes, so many years later, of the school she attended, have combined to ensure a

significant investment in girls' education.

The Foundation is now in a position, from funds that have been built up for the purposes of awarding bursaries and scholarships and for building an endowment, to make an investment of sufficient size into a suitable product. The investment vehicle selected meets our criteria of outperformance of inflation, achievement of steady, long-term capital growth and limitation of the risk of capital loss, and is managed by one of the largest managers of institutional assets in South Africa, one already associated with the school, thus affording us cost benefits. The income generated from that investment will provide the revenue stream from which bursaries and scholarships can be funded.

Of course, we still have a long way to go to build up an endowment fund large enough

to fund all our objectives, but we are determined to build on the momentum we currently enjoy to build a Foundation of significance; one that can claim to ensure the sustainability of St Mary's, and the ongoing education of girls of whom St Mary's can be proud.

Alexandra High Schools' Programme

The 2013 Alexandra matriculation class achieved a 97% pass rate and 77% achieved a Bachelor's degree pass. Brilliant Moyo received five distinctions and Fernando Sibiya four. Extra Mathematics lessons were offered during the week at Kwa-Bhekilanga for three months in 2013, and this group achieved nine As and 11 Bs for Mathematics. The group of matriculants from Waverley Girls', Highlands Boys' and Northview High achieved a 100% pass rate, 91% Bachelor's degree pass rates and 49 distinctions.

In 2014, 300 Grade 10, 11 and 12 learners attended Saturday and school holiday classes at St Mary's and at the Jabula Recreation Centre. English, Mathematics, Physical Science, Life Science, Geography, Accounting, Economic Management Science, Business Studies, study and entrepreneurial skills, desktop publishing, public speaking and computer literacy were taught by Ingrid Zlobinsky-Roux, Rosinah Mosoeu, Cindy Len, Carolyn Huysamer, Lynn Knowles and teachers from the wider community.

A Grade 10 enrichment programme, taught by Sue Heydenrych, Lauren Frost, René Plant, Linda Bradfield and other facilitators, assisted by Senior School girls, was arranged once a term and included tennis coaching, emotional intelligence, pottery, tie-dying and iPad workshops. The Character Institute ran a life skills course for a group of Grade 10 girls. The Grade 11 classes learned to bake scones and decorate cupcakes. All the classes attended a small business course and AMKA donated products for start-up businesses. Four classes were taught by a creative team to design a logo. The winners of the logo design competition were awarded IPads, donated by the Ford Motor Company.

Trips were arranged to the Ford Motor Company careers day, the science festival in Sasolburg, the St Mary's careers evening and an award trip for excellent attendance to Gold Reef City. The Sizanani Mentorship Programme registered as a NPC.

OLD GIRLS' RECOGNITION AWARDS 2014

The Old Girls' Association believes it is important to acknowledge Old Girls who have made a significant difference and contribution. These awards were initiated in 2008, and this year we recognise some outstanding Old Girls.



Val Kempis (Raeburn, 1951 – Category of Role Model, and for embodying the spirit of what it means to be a St Mary's Old Girl)

Circumstances totally outside her control dictated that Val Kempis (Raeburn) left St Mary's some 63 years ago, at the end of what would now be called her Grade 10 year. Ever since, she has been a consistently supportive and enthusiastic member of the wider St Mary's school family. Not an Old Girls' or even St Mary's event goes by where Val is not present, and her dedication and encouragement of all things St Mary's is quite astounding. Val's sheer passion for the school has continued in two further generations of her family attending the school — her daughter Deidre Shepherd (1982) and currently her two granddaughters, Ashleigh and Kate. Val has been recognised here in the category of role models, as we believe the kind of passion that she demonstrates towards St Mary's is a fine example to all.



MPHO MATSIPA (1994 – CATEGORY OF THE ARTS)

Mpho Matsipa, who is working towards her PhD in Architecture and African Urbanism at the University of California, Berkeley, where she gained her MSc, is a lecturer at the Wits School of Architecture and Planning. She gained her degree in Architecture from the University of Cape Town, and was recently awarded a Doctorate from Harvard. Mpho is a director of Studio-X Johannesburg, which aims to create a public platform to explore alternative imaginaries of the city, with particular focus on the future of global connection, productive collaboration and exchange. Mpho has worked as an architect and been shortlisted in two prestigious national design competitions. She has curated several exhibitions, including that of the South Africa Pavilion at the 11th International Architecture Exhibition, Venice Biennale. She has received several academic awards and scholarships, including the Fulbright Award and a Carnegie Grant.



Yumna Laher (2007 – Category of Arts and Sciences)

While at St Mary's, Yumna Laher had the distinction of being awarded a Victrix Honorum blazer after gaining Academic, Cultural and Service Honours. Yumna completed a BA Honours in International Relations and a Master of Arts degree in International Relations at Wits. She won a Mandela-Rhodes Scholarship, arguably the most sought-after scholarship globally, where the recipient has to display "the moral force of character and instinct to lead". Yumna was an active and dedicated member of the Old Girls committee for a number of years. She reflects: "Although ecstatic about receiving the scholarship, it has since left me with a deep sense of responsibility to use the opportunity I have been given with care. The Mandela-Rhodes experience has reinforced parts of my character I hope to be remembered for; the dignity with which I treat others, the honesty with which I approach my decisions, and the integrity with which I live my life. It has allowed me to be me; a little more grounded, more confident, definitely more qualified and infinitely blessed with the experience of a lifetime." (University of the Witwatersrand website)



JESSICA STANDISH-WHITE (2009 – CATEGORY OF ROLE MODEL)

Jessica Standish-White's life and achievements epitomise the holistic outlook in which St Mary's believes. Her matric results were awe-inspiring and she was an incredible St Mary's girl who always displayed kindness, enthusiasm and dedication. She excelled on the cultural and academic fronts, and also played hockey for the 1st team. Jess studied Business Science and Economics at the University of Cape Town, and has subsequently become the recipient of an Oxford scholarship. She is passionate about education, leadership and service. In 2009, as deputy head girl, she organised an HIV testing drive to create awareness and stimulate open discussion.



Lilian du Plessis (2011 – Category of Sport)

At age 21, Lilian du Plessis is one of the youngest members of the South African national women's hockey team, having represented South Africa at both the World Cup and the Commonwealth Games. Her sights are set on the next Olympic Games. At school, according to Ros Howell, Lilian spent hours training on her own to perfect some of the tactics for which she has become famous ... the drag flick and the reverse stick hit. Lilian was also a good rower and technical all-rounder. She is also recognised here for her kindness and sportsmanship, both on and off the field. Lilian played in the Old Girls vs St Mary's hockey match on Old Girls' Day alongside two other previous recipients of this award, Shelley Russell (2005) and Lisa-Marie Deetlefs (2005).



Pauline Grainger (Category of Community)

Pauline Grainger is not an Old Girl but has recently been recognised as an honorary one. She joined St Mary's in 1972, taught English and History and later headed up the History department. It is appropriate that Pauline receives this award after all of the years she has selflessly served the St Mary's family, culminating in the writing of the school's history in 2013. *Celebrating 125 Years of St Mary's* is an informative and entertaining read about the school, especially its pupils and teachers. We formally thank Pauline for ensuring that the treasured memories of all that has made St Mary's, have been painstakingly recorded.
