Dear parents

A school is a dynamic and exciting environment in which to work. Not only are we interacting on a daily basis with young people who have minds and characters that are forming, but education and thinking about teaching and learning are changing rapidly. The teachers at St Mary's have embraced these changes and they contribute time during each week to participate in professional development, which will enhance their teaching and the girls' learning experiences.

Areas of specific change include ICT integration into the classroom across all forms, innovation in Mathematics teaching and the introduction of project-based learning for the Form Is. These interventions have been carefully researched and the results will be

monitored with ongoing reflection.

The methodologies that I have mentioned will not impact on the academic standards and rigour that are an expectation in our environment, but they will improve accessibility for our girls who live in a visual and technological world. Dr Sally James, Mr Muhammed Jeenah and Mrs Linda Bradfield are leading this work, and they are being assisted by Ms Gail Murray and Ms Jaclyn Paules. I have also employed Ms Lilian Southey, who has a multi-disciplinary background, and she will bring her expertise to both Mathematics and ICT integration. I welcome her to St Mary's.

An important factor for ensuring the academic standards and expertise amongst our teachers also lies in the

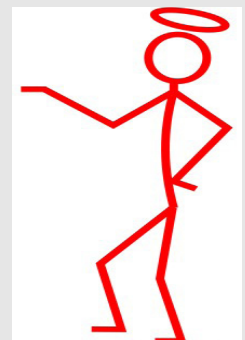

As a part of the Form I orientation programme, pupils were involved in a number of workshops introducing them to the multiple ways in which IT will become a part of their lives in the Senior School. At the outset, IT protocol and policy were discussed with the correct etiquette as far as the use of devices at school is concerned. Mundane but important access functions such as logins, passwords and email set up were covered. The printing process was also explained, and girls were encouraged where possible to restrict their printing habits. Parents are encouraged to support us in this regard. At St Mary's we are on a serious drive to reduce our paper usage and wastage in 2015!

Featured apps

A fair amount of the day was spent working with iPads, since this year marks the first year when each Form I is required to have her own personal device. Particular applications were introduced and focused upon, which girls will be required to use across their various subject areas. These included

the **myHomework app** and the **Calendar**, whereby digital planning and organisation are encouraged. **Limu** and **iTunes U** were also introduced. Limu is the school's dedicated learning management application. Here girls will have access to a spectrum of material and resources in their various subjects. This tool is also used in the electronic submission of assignments and has a link to **Turnitin** - the antiplagiarism software extensively used in the Senior School.

Globally, more universities and schools have active iTunes U sites. This includes our own school. St Mary's has developed our own private iTunes site for the use of and distribution of material and courses. iTunes U provides each girl with a customised learning experience, which means learning and studying can happen anywhere. Initially, the girls will be introduced to iTunes U in their Maths and Natural Sciences lessons.

Notability is a versatile note-taking application that is useful to the pupils when

making their own notes in a lesson or during a group work discussion, as an example. Notability also allows for easy annotation of class notes provided by the teacher. Girls were introduced to some basic note-taking skills, which will become useful as they move through the Senior School and eventually onto tertiary study.

Lastly, pupils were introduced to St Mary's eLibrary, which uses the **Overdrive** application. A vast array of fiction and non-fiction ebooks is available to our school community via this app.

A great deal was covered during the day. Girls can look forward to developing a greater understanding and appreciation of such tools as they navigate their way through Form I in 2015.

Senior School annual photography competition

All Senior School girls are encouraged to enter the Senior School photography competition. This competition is essential for school colours in photography. Colours are a requirement for the Cultural Honours blazer, as well as for the Certificate of Excellence from the Photographic Society of South Africa. The best photographs will be printed in the school magazine.

Prizes

There are **five prizes of R500 each** for the five best photographers. These will be awarded at final assembly at the end of Term I.

The closing date for entries is Friday 6 March, and no late entries will be accepted.

Every pupil who enters will be given a mention. You may submit your entries to me at any time. Please ensure that you add your name to the competition entry list in my office to get a mention.

The photographs may be black-and-white or colour prints on any subject. Photos may be enhanced with computer manipulation. Each competition finalist is required to submit her original photograph in .jpg format to me for final judging.

The minimum size of each photograph is 15cm x 21cm, and the maximum size is 30cm x 40cm.

The photograph must be neatly mounted with a 5cm border of a single clean black

stiff cardboard. Each photograph must have a title. Your name, form, photograph title and full description of camera used must be clearly printed on the back. No writing may appear on the front.

All photographs must have been taken by you personally but printing, processing and mounting may be done commercially. There is no entrance fee. There is no limit to the number of entries you may submit. The photographs become the property of St Mary's and no responsibility is accepted for loss or damage. The judges' decision is final.

If you have never used the digital library before, please refer to the step-by-step instructions at the above site. Pupils are welcome to bring their devices to the Wantage Centre at any time and we shall

help them to get started.

Ebooks and audiobooks may be downloaded onto any device such as laptops, desktops, smartphones, iPads, eReaders (except Kindle) and various other mobile devices.

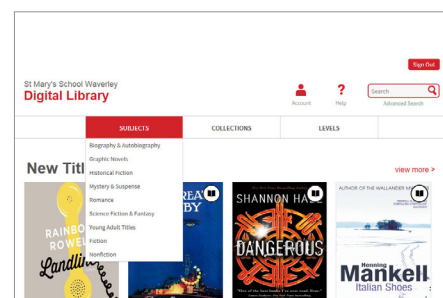
Users manage their own accounts. The advantage is that these books cannot be lost and, unless renewed by the user, are returned automatically to the digital library on due date, resulting in no more overdue book fines.

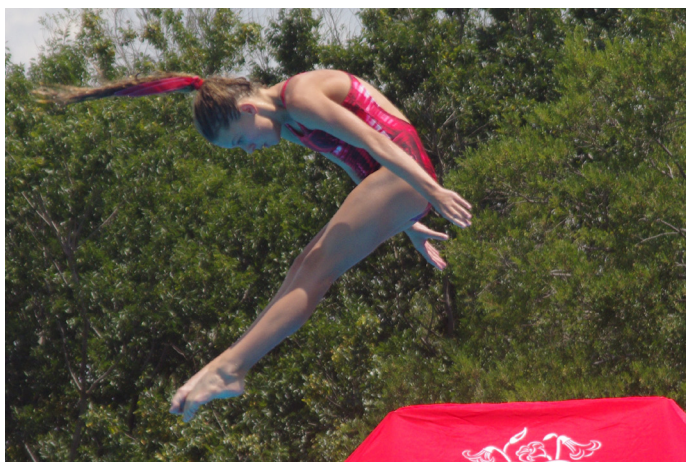
