Senior dance and drama

This is the first year that 5678 Productions has been responsible for all co-curricular dance and drama at St Mary's. We offer three senior dance classes: a Latin dance class, an open drama class and Trinity drama examinations. We also train and manage the St Mary's dance crew.

There are three senior open dance classes offered per week and the girls are instructed in jazz and contemporary dance styles, with warm-up exercises focusing on technique, strength and stretching. They learn one new dance number per term so that, if girls miss classes owing to their busy schedules, they have ample opportunity to catch up during that term or start afresh in the new term. The choreography for the

dance numbers is demanding but the girls always rise to the challenge.

The Latin class has grown and we are introducing a competition class where girls may enter national competitions. The girls will perform the same routines for the competitions as for the exams for which they have already prepared. They dance the cha-cha, samba, paso doble and jive.

The St Mary's dance crew worked on two unique pieces this year and competed in the inter-high dance competition held at St Peter's College on 17 September. I am extremely happy with the high standard of dance the girls have produced.

The Trinity drama exams were held in the AV room on Tuesday 15 September, and there were 16 entrants. Two solo performances and four groups with 14 participants were entered. The performances were well prepared and rehearsed, utilising the expertise of well-known actor and physical theatre performer Craig Morris.

I am thrilled with the response to the classes, and commit to growing the On the Edge dance and drama project to encourage girls to express themselves through these art forms.



Transforming the page to screen with technology

Reading and technology are integral parts of Form I English. Teen fiction, in particular, is an important step in literature as it exposes readers to moral dilemmas, develops a sense of identity and explores the coming-of-age experiences of other teens. Technology allows students to drive innovation, showcase creativity and provide ingenious solutions to challenges using peer teaching.

In the first term, the girls were divided into book club groups based on their reading profile. The carefully selected teen reads tackled issues such as ethics, inequality, being different, problem solving and a dystopian future. Each book club recorded their reading experiences in a journal using Book Creator. The group also completed various tasks on their novel from critiquing minor characters to unpacking themes and designing alternative book covers.

In the second term, the Form Is honed their film techniques with sessions on camera shots and angles, storyboarding and a valuable workshop on advanced editing techniques. Last week, each group had one day to film, source stills and sound, provide closing credits and edit a book trailer to entice teens to read their novel. The detailed storyboards developed last term were pivotal to the success

of the trailers. Each stage of the process was carefully documented, with reflective feedback.

The evening of Friday 11 September saw the Form Is donning onesies and pyjamas to attend the screening of their book trailers. Gasps of amazement and thunderous applause followed each trailer as the groups wowed the audience with clever storylines, innovative use of apps and crisp editing. The girls enjoyed snacking on popcorn and St Mary's "mockaberries" at the interval, while the Form I English team started carefully assessing the individual skills in each group.





St Mary's water polo never seems to stop. In the August holidays we had girls on the international scene, competing for South Africa and proudly representing St Mary's.

2014/2015 captain Amber was selected for the SA U20 team and competed in the FINA U20 Women's Water Polo World Championships in Volos, Greece.

Here are some of her words from her experience;

"In August I had the opportunity to represent my country at the FINA U20 Women's Water Polo World Championships in Volos, Greece. The level of water polo, as well as the immense talent that I was able to witness and play against, was remarkable. The experience was challenging and inspiring as my team played against some of the top water polo players in the world. The South African team placed 15th overall. This result was slightly disappointing for us as, had we not lost to Great Britain in a play-off game, we could have placed higher. The team was cohesive and worked well together, making the experience a memorable

one and allowing me to appreciate every moment of the event. When we sang our national anthem before each match I became overwhelmed with pride as I realised that I was playing this sport, one that I am so passionate about, for my country."

Sasha and Lace were selected for the U17 SA team to compete in the EU Nations U17 Tournament in Prague, Czech Republic. Kirsty was selected as a non-travelling reserve. Unfortunately, Lace was unable to take part owing to an injury.

This is what Sasha had to say about her time in Prague;

"I was honoured to be a part of the U17 South African water polo team and play a total of five international matches for my country. International water polo is a far more physical game than the one we are accustomed to back home.

The competition at the EU Nations U17 Tournament, held in Prague, Czech

Republic, this September, consisted of 10 international teams ranging from novice to more experienced ones. All the participating countries engage in the sport at an amateur level. The teams were housed on a floating boat hotel on the VItava River, which made for great camaraderie and spirit.

My South African team managed to make it into the semi-finals against the Czech Republic. After this long and exciting match we achieved a win, securing our place in the finals against Slovakia. Our final was a tightly-fought encounter against a very physically strong team. We ended up missing gold by one goal after the match went to penalty shootouts, coming home with the silver medal.

It was a great privilege to wear the South African flag on my costume and to represent my country, my province and also fly the flag for St Mary's at an international event."

Imaan competed in two ITF tournaments in Zimbabwe, and reached the quarter-finals of the singles in one event and reached the quarter-finals in both doubles events. Imaan has a world ITF U18 ranking of 634.

Maja competed in two international tournaments in Mauritius, and reached a quarter-final and semi-final in the singles event of the Mauritian U18 Open. Maja beat the number four seed from Hong Kong along the way. Her ITF U18 ranking is 670.

Cara trained at an academy in Belgium, and participated in two tournaments on clay. She trained at the Justine Henin Academy and met Sofia, who is the current Junior Wimbledon champion. She did extremely well in the tournaments. Cara had to qualify for both tournaments and reached the

quarter-finals of both events in the singles. She also reached the semi-finals of the doubles in the Uccle Trophy with a partner from the Czech Republic. This tournament was held at the Royal Leopold club in Brussels, which boasts 22 clay courts. Playing on clay was a great experience for Cara, and her game benefited from the many matches played against tough opposition.

On the local front, congratulations to Tegan, who reached the finals of the open singles event in the Rietondale Champions Challenge tournament in Pretoria.

Congratulations to Ruth who reached the semi-finals of the singles and won the doubles title in the U18 Gauteng Central Mini-series Tournament. Nina also did extremely well in the U18 tournaments in Mpumalanga and Middelburg, where she placed 3rd and 6th in the singles events respectively. I encourage each of you to

keep up the hard work and dedication.

During the holidays, it was announced that three players from St Mary's have qualified for the prestigious South African Masters event, which will be held in Stellenbosch in October. 
