Dear parents

As a school we acknowledge our responsibility to educate our girls in a holistic sense. The girls who leave St Mary's should be prepared for further studies and should be able to work effectively in a field of their choosing. They should also be prepared to take their places in society, and to make a contribution to our country and the world. Our aim is for girls to leave St Mary's as confident, hard-working and resilient individuals who deeply respect and value common humanity.

These aims are threatened when the girls' interactions with each other are tainted by nastiness, judgement and intolerance. Such behaviour is unacceptable and works against everything that we value and teach the girls at St Mary's. An understanding of our country's complex history leads us to expect a pupil body to be supportive, non-racial and one that stands for anti-racism and anti-sexism.

St Mary's is committed to developing aware, informed and empathetic citizens.

Advocate Wim Trengove's son Markus displays such awareness in this posting:

This is why I have to be successful: I benefited from the injustice of apartheid. Although I did not choose it, my race, gender and language have allowed me to inherit certain privileges. The right response is no longer to bury my head in shame.





Form I e4 outing to Alexandra township

St Mary's continues to develop its good relationship with the community of Alexandra, not only through community outreach and education projects with the local schools, but also by visiting the township itself.

The annual Form I outing to Alexandra township took place on Tuesday 20 October. The outing was organised in two parts. Girls spent half the day touring the township, exploring aspects of the history and daily life of a typical Alex resident. Housing, infrastructure, transportation and urban-renewal projects across the township were explored.

The second part of the outing involved an investigation into the economy of the township, during which the girls conducted surveys

with local business owners. Various business owners were interviewed: taxi drivers, restaurant managers and informal fruit sellers along the pavements were some of these. The survey revealed the enormous economic disparities which exist within our country, as well as the numerous challenges that small business owners face on a daily basis.

During the outing, Kelsey, Kate, Ronewa and Gabriella were selected to be involved in a live discussion on the community radio station AlexFM. The girls spoke confidently about their visit to Alexandra and about the warm welcome they received from community members.

Move-It, Moving Matters Team[™]

On Monday 26 October, members of the Move-It, Moving Matters[™] Team, St Mary's Form III and IV girls and the H A Jack community came together to celebrate a showcase of motor skills acquired and demonstrated by Grade 4 H A Jack learners.

Since January 2015, Kim Morris, a Move-It, Moving Matters[™] programme co-ordinator and dedicated St Mary's School hockey mum, has been facilitating the Grade 4 learners progressively in the first stage of Move-It, Moving Matters[™] Blue Kit.

Born out of the need for an intermediate-phase physical education intervention, Move-It, Moving Matters^m is a phase-specific programme which systematically shapes neuro-muscular development and the physiological capacity of growing children. The programme starts with the Blue Kit in Grade 4, progresses to the Red Kit in Grade 5, the Yellow Kit in Grade 6 and finally the Green Kit in Grade 7.

The effect of regular participation in activity challenges is such that bone mass and cardio-respiratory efficiency are also improved and children "catch up" physically during this important developmental period. However, it is the unique read-do-write methodological approach of the programme which ensures holistic learning and the simultaneous development of multiple literacies.

What was witnessed on Monday was the culmination of many skills acquired in a Mini-Olympics event which required the participation of all learners in the grade. It was in this event that the St Mary's girls played a particularly important part. Under Kim's guidance the event was managed and delivered by the girls. In addition, these girls have been mentoring Grade 7 H A Jack learners using the Move-It Programme.

St Mary's plays a key role in the support and enrichment given to H A Jack learners. It is this kind of school partnership that not only builds communities but strengthens bonds between children and nurtures hope for the future for all. The Move-It Programme is one of the community service programmes offered at St Mary's.

GASP[™] is the next step of Move-It, Moving Matters[™] in that motoricallytalented children are set upon Pathways to Success via collaborative public and private sector networks. In order to celebrate and advance these children they are placed into district-based competitions and festivals such as the event which took place this week.

This event was made possible with the help and support of St Mary's School, Waverley and generous funding from Community Assisting Schools. Not only did the children feel proud to have a platform on which to showcase their Move-It skills but the community at large was given insight into how Move-It, Moving Matters[™] and GASP[™] are empowering and advancing youth in South Africa.

Athletics

The St Mary's athletes certainly saved their best performance for when it counted. Sincere congratulations to Roger Haitengi, our stalwart coach, to Liezle van der Walt who has helped with both the high jump and long jump every week, and to captain Victoria and vice-captain Julia.

The team effort and camaraderie on the day were superb and we literally ran away with the trophy although Brescia House has closed the gap on us since last year. There are few girls who do athletics as their first-choice sport. The vast majority fit athletics in around swimming, tennis, squash, diving, rowing, water polo and basketball. This means that we never have a full team at training, and practising relays happens at weekly meetings if all four athletes are fit and present. We did the best we could with the preparation time we had and I can only compliment and admire the athletes.

We won only 16 events (compared with 25 last year) but we came 2^{nd} in 12 and 3^{rd} in seven events. This translates to 35 top-three finishes out of 46 events and we have learned that the results are not necessarily dependent on winning but on consistently being placed in the top three.

Sincere congratulations to the following girls who broke records: Jade had a massive leap of 1,65m in the junior high jump (this is higher than the senior high jump record); Alexandra broke the U15B 80m hurdles record in a time of 13.15 seconds and Carly broke the U16B 200m record in a time of 27.03 seconds.

I should also like to make special mention of Amy and Jaime, our 2014 captain and vice-captain, who joined us this season and were able to be an important part of the inter-high team as they did not have a matric examination on Wednesday 21 October.

Owing to camps, illness and injury, it has been a tough season but, in true St Mary's style, the girls were the best that they could be. Well done athletes. We are very proud of you and very happy to have our name on the trophy for the 8^{th} consecutive year.


