## FROM THE CHAPLAIN

On Tuesday, it was confirmed that South Africa is in a technical recession, having recorded a negative gross domestic product (GDP) for at least two consecutive quarters. Essentially, this means our country's economy is shrinking, while our population continues to expand.

How do we seek to live in a recession, as Christians, and therefore in the knowledge that we are stewards of God's creation – of all that we have and are?

Firstly, we must urge our country's political, economic and industry leaders to meet to envision an economy characterised by growth, and to action the step-by-step plans to realise that vision, year on year. Let us pray for our leaders that they may be led by the gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, and love for the people entrusted to their care by God. Bishop Steve Moreo's letters to our diocese (available on our school app) with regard to moral activism are relevant in this regard.

Secondly, the author of 1 Timothy states that "there is great gain in godliness combined with contentment" (6:6). As a community, as families and as individuals, we need to plan our expenditure with the aim of being content, rather than trying to find satisfaction in ever more acquisitions.

Thirdly, Christ's consistent message throughout the Gospels is that of a preferential option for the poor, oppressed, marginalised and defenseless.

As Archbishop Thabo Makgoba emphasised when our country received its first downgrade by a ratings agency recently, the first to be impacted by a shrinking economy are the poor. It is vital, to the extent that each of us is able within our own spheres of influence, to look to increase job opportunities.

Nelson Mandela prioritised quality education for all in his time as president of our nation. Such education is a right enshrined in our country's Constitution. Investing in our education sector is to plan strategically for our future as a country. It is to prepare our children and our adults to lead our country creatively, and wisely, to a better future.

As Christians we are called always, and even in the face of despair, to hope, because at Easter each year we remember that Christ has overcome. In our country today, we are called to encourage each other to look forward to a different future for all in our country – to discern God's leading the way, through us, to make that hope real and lived for all.

Above all, let us pray for ourselves and for all in our nation, in the firm and certain knowledge that prayer changes both reality and ourselves in our perception of, and approach to, that reality.
