

FROM THE JUNIOR SCHOOL HEAD'S DESK

And... we're back! Most of us regret the passing of the holidays, but there are also those who speak of the tedium of long absences from school or work and wish for a return to routine and the more predictable rhythm of five days of toil and two of rest. While many parents report feeling overwhelmed at the prospect of keeping their loved ones entertained over the long weeks of leisure, children complain they are bored - as often as four times a day in some surveys - and family relationships take strain, and occasionally snap, under the pressure of high expectations and extended exposure.

With changes in climate and the rise in global temperatures, the tradition of the long summer break and the school calendar in the Northern hemisphere might have to be reimagined. Climate researchers measuring summer heat and monitoring the drought, floods, and fire that it brings in its wake are arguing for the renaming of summer as the "danger season." Another well-documented if less immediately obvious danger of the long summer break that affects children relates to academic performance: turns out that teachers' exhortations to pupils to read over the holidays are more well motivated than many parents and children might think.

However we feel about holiday, and whatever happens to the timing of seasonal vacations around the world, the return to school always brings with it a sense of celebration: the children come back changed, with stories to relate, and plans to execute. They bring with them an appetite for new experiences and a hunger for what's next. It is hard not to feel lucky to be in a junior school at times like this.

At the beginning of every term, we extend a warm welcome to your children in assemblies, chapel, and individual classes. This newsletter is my opportunity to do the same with you: we wish all our families, old and new, a rewarding Michaelmas term and look forward to the opportunity to deepen our relationships and enjoy new experiences together.

We have already hosted our Special Persons' Days at Little Saints, met our class reps, and begun practising for events scheduled later in the term. Along with heads of Independent Schools across the country, Deanne King and I have been off campus for the last few days attending the ISASA/SAHISA/SABISA combined conference, and the Junior School hosted Benjamin Rosman, professor in Artificial Intelligence and Robotics at WITS, onsite for a talk on the changing landscape of education. There is so much to look forward to on the calendar, including the online engagement with members of the St Mary's board next week, the Stand Up St Mary's comedy show, and the music and sports events and fixtures that keep your daughters busy and committed every term. The annual Little Saints concert, *Little Saints Sings*, is also in rehearsal, and its theme of underwater creatures and the world of the ocean inspired my choice of image for this week's article - taken from the exquisite *Waterlife* by Indian artist, Rambharos Jha, the book is silk-screen printed by hand on handmade paper and features Mithila art, "a vibrant and delicate form of folk painting from Bihar in eastern India." FROM THE CHAPLAIN

Forgiveness is valued by most if not all, societies and faiths. At the first Eucharist of the term, I mentioned to the girls how the new school term offers them the opportunity to begin and try again. I linked the beginning of the third term to the penitence. Penitence is the part of the Eucharist liturgy where we ask forgiveness for the bad we have done and the good we have failed to do. As the psalmist writes, "Blessed is the one whose transgressions are forgiven, whose sins are covered" (Psalm 32:1).

Professor Phumla Gobodo-Madikizela describes forgiveness as an offender's request to rejoin the community. Her view of forgiveness revolves around empathy, understanding, humanization, and collective healing. She sees forgiveness as a profoundly transformative process that can contribute to reconciliation and healing in post-conflict societies. Forgiveness is a critical part of repairing broken and strained relationships. In her research on the emergence of forgiveness in young children, Dr Amrisha Vaish (2021) believes that from early on, children seek out people who apologize, show remorse, and feel concern for someone who has been harmed. People who show remorse and apologize to a child signal their commitment to the child and their relationship with them.

At school, our discipline procedure is guided by a philosophy of restorative justice. Making mistakes is part of the process of learning. Therefore, it is vital that as part of the learning that happens at school, girls learn to use the tools needed to repair relationships. Forgiveness and asking for forgiveness is one such tool.



Did you know that these St Mary's teachers share their knowledge and skills every Saturday?

The St Mary's Foundation runs the Ikusasa Lethu Programme every Saturday, on our St Mary's campus, from January to October. Our aim is to supplement the education of committed learners who attend schools in Alexandra during the week. Over 350 learners come to our school to learn from the St Mary's teachers, as well as other skilled educators from recognised schools around Johannesburg.

Cindy Len has been teaching Geography to disadvantaged Grade 10 and 11 learners on Saturdays for 13 years. She is often named by learners as a teacher who has made a life-changing impact on their understanding and results.

Jayne Murewa has been running our Ikusasa Lethu library for eight years, and this year started a crochet club which meets after school ends on Saturdays at 14h00.

Themba Ndimande has been working with the Ikusasa Lethu CAT learners in Grade 10, 11 and 12 since 2019. He teaches them beyond their syllabus, showing the learners the practical applications of their subject. This gives them an understanding they could not otherwise gain.

Lebohang Makhalanyane has taught Mathematics for six years. Her classes are always engaging and give learners a second chance to understand concepts they may be struggling with at their own schools.

Revd Rakgadi Khobo joined our staff as a Life Orientation teacher this year, along with Lebogang Mohlahlana and Bonginkosi Ginindza in the Mathematics department.


