
The week ended with Patronal Festival, where the whole school was present. Each part of the school participated in the Eucharist services.

MUSE MORNINGS

Muse Mornings and parents' conversations are the brainchild of the Open Door department. The initiative stemmed from a need in our community for a platform where our parents could engage with professionals from outside the school on issues that are of relevance to the development of their children.

The original meaning of the word "muse" means to ponder, reflect or to absorb in thought. This has been and continues to be the sole aim of our Muse Mornings: to offer parents a platform where they can grapple with the issues involving child rearing and development on their own, with others and with the guidance of knowledgeable professionals.

Muse Mornings have been held over many years - we have invited a wide range of speakers on extensive topics, some of which have been suggested by our parent body. We have engaged with psychologists from different fields, a gynecologist, dietician and physiotherapist.

Some of the topics which have been addressed in the past are:

- how to raise your daughters in a masculine world
- helping your daughter develop a healthy relationship with food
- and many conversations around anxiety in children and strategies to help them manage anxiety

A gynecologist was invited to speak with our fathers on how to have conversations with their daughters about their changing bodies and we are proud that our fathers arrived en masse for the talk. In the last two years of the pandemic, our speakers have targeted their conversations at supporting parents in helping their children to navigate the emotional challenges that arose out of the pandemic.

Muse Mornings are held once a term in the mornings from 07h30 - 08h30. Please look out for newsletters and the school app for the notification of the next exciting presentation. We look forward to engaging with our parents, appreciate their input and welcome any topics that they believe will be of benefit to our community.





To help them understand some of the scientific concepts explored in the novel, Professor Zeblon Vilakazi came to speak to the girls about the work being done at The European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN).

As a nuclear physicist and a fellow of the Royal Society UK, Professor Vilakazi was able to answer the girls' questions about particles, energy, mass and black holes. They learnt more about the experiments conducted at the Large Hadron Collider and their curiosity about the origins of the universe was piqued.

THE SWEETHEART FOUNDATION

Grade 4 Learner Inspires Schools to Collect Bottle Caps for Charity - excerpt from the article that featured in https://www.goodthingsguy.com/

10-year-old Ella encouraged her school to start collecting bottle tops and bread tags as a way to help others access wheelchairs, now she hopes to inspire more people to help.

Ella Sproule started collecting bottle tops, and bread tags for the Sweethearts Foundation in 2018 after her granny's friend Maureen lost her battle with cancer. The then 5-year-old was introduced to the foundation's work by Maureen and became inspired to give back.

According to her mom, Fiona Sproule, Ella had been growing in her environmental activism activities. She started at home by banning straws in the house as well as making sure every family member picked up at least three pieces of plastic during their beach visits.

Today, she is still as passionate about saving the environment and gifting wheelchairs to those in need. Ella took the concept to her school, St. Mary's Waverley, and before long, the whole school was collecting bread tags and bottle tops for the Sweethearts Foundation. The foundation recycles these plastic items and uses the funds to buy underprivileged people much-needed wheelchairs.

Now at the age of 10, Ella has seen that due to Covid, the collection numbers have dropped. She hopes to inspire people to start collecting the little plastic bits and dropping them off at her school.

Speaking to Jessica Gordon, the manager of the Sweethearts Foundation's Johannesburg branch, she shared that in 2021 Ella and St. Mary's collected around 262.6kg of bottle tops. It is a great help when large schools, organisations and businesses take up the cause as it means the ability to collect meaningful amounts to purchase wheelchairs goes up. However, even one person can make a difference,

Deputy Headmistress Di Gordon shared that the school has several ways they recycle on the property but being able to recycle in this manner and give back to those in need, is a very rewarding effort for all the young girls involved. They use the tops as currency for house points, and each young girl that brings in 10 tops.

Ella hopes that more people will support this cause as it is so easy to do so. You can contact the Sweethearts Foundation if you want to get your school involved; they will be able to direct you to the nearest branch in your area for ease of drop-off.

Junior School equestrian team SANESA Qualifier 3

It was a cold and wet Saturday morning on 21 May when the Junior School equestrian team met at Kyalami Equestrian Park for the third SANESA qualifier.

The Saturday was a busy day with nearly all the team riding. The girls competed in Showjumping, Prix Caprilli and Equitation classes and they and their horses and ponies performed well.

There were two showjumping classes: one where they had to ride a clear round in order to qualify to ride in the jumpoff for the best time and a speed class where they ride for the fastest time in a class. The riders jumped heights from 50cm to 80cm. Vivienne Chen rode in the 50cm classes, Kathryn Breedveld and Mia Terblanche jumped in the 60cm classes, Astrid Blair and Ella Mundell rode in the 70cm classes and Astrid Blair and Emma Frahm-Arp competed in the 80cm classes. Frustratingly, a knocked jump can mean the difference between a first place or a placing further down the rankings.

The equitation girls are marked on how well they ride and present their horses in a test that includes both flatwork and a short jumping course. Prix Caprilli is essentially a dressage test with two or three added jumps. Here the riders need good control and neatness. Sunday was a little warmer and calmer and three girls participated in Dressage, Performance Riding and Working Riding. Katleho Vilakazi, Astrid Blair and Emma Frahm-Arp competed and between them rode eight classes and collected four first places, a second place and 3 placings.

Between the seven riders they rode eight ponies in 35 classes with 20 placings, nine first places, three second places, one third and two fourth places. At the moment, the St Mary's Junior School team is well in first place in their category.

Well done to all the riders and their ponies and we look forward to having Lucy Barrow back for the next qualifier and wish her horse a speedy recovery.





St Mary's uses a school management information system called Ed-Admin to distribute termly school reports and to provide parents with an opportunity to inspect and amend personal information recorded in our database.

Below, please find details as to how to access this Ed-Admin St Mary's portal:

- You will require a Parent ID whenever signing into the parent portal. If you are unsure of your Parent ID, please email <u>portal@stmary.co.za</u> with both your and your daughter's names and surnames for assistance.
- To access the St Mary's portal, please click on the link below or visit the school website on www.stmarysschool.co.za and click on the portal login on the top right of the page. https://stmarysw.ed-space.net/pparentportal.cfm
- Enter in your Parent ID and choose forgot password. Please ensure that you enter the email address that St Mary's has on record and enter in the CAPTCHA code.
- You will then receive an email. Once received, click on the link in order to set up your password. Choose a secure password; you will then receive another email to confirm your password has been changed. You can now proceed to log into the portal.
