The unlikely collaboration brought to life in our play, the band of misfits who show us what it is to be brave, are also our girls, staff and parents who, not just this week or even this term, go forward together - again and again and again. Make no mistake, launching and living projects like this is how we keep each other brave.

The sheer scale of the thing (how many times have I been told we are crazy to want to put Grades 1 to 7 on stage together?), the feat of imagination, adaptation, and compromise it requires to get it on stage - and what a stage it was! - is worth considering. Considering and celebrating.

Well done, St Mary's, for allowing girls who weren't even sure they wanted to audition to take centre stage, look an audience in the eye, and challenge them to "see past what is right in front of us"; for allowing our staff and parents to conjure a world of characters and creatures (a goat!) out of words, music, dance, sound and lighting, make-up, costumes and raw talent - and remind us to "imagine things can be different".

"For what matters in the end is love. Love, and also... stories." After three years of waiting and watching, we took the opportunity to tell our story again. And it is clear to me - you too, I think - that what we believe in, is love.

Travel safely, read, rest, enjoy the time spent together. We look forward to seeing you back on campus in September.

End-of-term chapel services involve us saying goodbye to girls who are leaving our school. It is never easy for the girls to bid farewell to friends, classmates and teachers.


In the Anglican church, the prayer service for farewell reads:

O God our Heavenly Father, whose glory fills the whole creation and whose presence we find everywhere we go, we give you thanks for the love and fellowship we have enjoyed with N and N. Surround them with your loving care and protect them from every danger, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

In his book, *Umsindleko: A Gcaleka Ritual of Incorporation* Patrick McAllister writes about the Xhosa rituals of sending migrant workers off and receiving them when they return. He describes the actions as rites of incorporation. This ritual is of interest as it shows us one society's response to migrant labour and its attempts to cope with it. This rite symbolises the importance of community. It symbolically unites and separates the person moving between two worlds.

The cultural practice resonates with our view of the girls as belonging to St Mary's, yet leaving us to join another community. Our task is to send them on their journey meaningfully. We do this by giving the girls a St Mary's candle and sending them out in God's name, asking Him to guide, strengthen and protect them in the days that lie ahead.

ED-ADMIN PARENT PORTAL

St Mary's uses a school management information system called Ed-Admin to distribute termly school reports and to provide parents with an opportunity to inspect and amend personal information recorded in our database.

Below, please find details as to how to access this Ed-Admin St Mary's portal:

- You will require a Parent ID whenever signing into the parent portal. If you are unsure of your Parent ID, please email <u>portal@stmary.</u> co.za with both your and your daughter's names and surnames for assistance.
- To access the St Mary's portal, please click on the link below or visit the school website on www.stmarysschool.co.za and click on the portal login on the top right of the page. https://stmarysw.ed-space.net/pparentportal.cfm
- Enter in your Parent ID and choose forgot password. Please ensure that you enter the email address that St Mary's has on record and enter in the CAPTCHA code.
- You will then receive an email. Once received, click on the link in order to set up your password. Choose a secure password; you will then receive another email to confirm your password has been changed. You can now proceed to log into the portal.


