# FROM THE ACTING HEADMISTRESS' DESK

#### Dear parents

Last week, the Grade 5, 6 and 7 girls all returned safely from their camps which took place at various venues. The selected camps were geared towards outdoor education for girls of their ages.

So why do we send girls on camp?

The benefits of camps are numerous:

Camps allow the teachers to see the girls in a different light – the studious girl may suddenly become the boisterous one or the quiet, reserved girl becomes the one who confidently shows others how to rock climb. A varied outdoor educational programme allows a break from categorisation. Girls get to know their teachers and the teachers are provided with the opportunity to learn more about the girls in their care.

The outdoor experience is structured to encourage the girls to take risks and face challenges. There is opportunity for personal growth as activities boost independence and decision making.

There are opportunities to form new friendships and several social circumstances present themselves. Socialising in a new and neutral environment makes it easier for some girls to reach out to others and they learn to rely on one another.

Camps foster teamwork and the activities often result in an appreciation of each other's efforts. The demands encourage resilience and several

leadership skills are nurtured. The girls realise that being the sportiest or loudest does not necessarily result in the most successful outcome for the group, and they learn that collaborative and creative thinking often leads to finding solutions.

Being busy outdoors forces the girls to communicate and socialise without the influence of electronics. Time away from the city allows for an appreciation of nature as well as physical activity. The days and nights spent away from home may provide the time for reflection on family values and they hopefully allow the girls the time to be grateful for all they have in their particular environments. Last but not least, camps provide fun experiences!

I take this opportunity to thank the teachers who took time away from their families to accompany the girls on camp. The Grade 4s will go on their camp in Term II as we like them to be settled into the Senior Primary phase.

The choir camp at school for Senior Primary girls commences on Friday 15 February and ends on Saturday 16 February. This promises to be a happy and worthwhile experience. The girls will be sleeping in the Senior Primary hall or in the library. Schools are exciting places after dark!

# FROM THE CHAPLAIN

#### The Stations of the Cross

Last year, St Mary's commissioned a new set of unique Stations of the Cross, painted by South African artist, Joseph Capelle. Capelle, a committed Christian, has created several sets of Stations of the Cross, for Roman Catholic Churches such as Holy Trinity in Braamfontein, St Martin de Porres in Soweto, and in St David's Marist Brothers chapel in Sandton.

Capelle's use of bright colours (which he employs to depict emotion) and his abstract style are what drew us to his work. To the traditional set of 14 Stations, we asked that Capelle add a 15th Station, depicting Christ's resurrection. We also asked Capelle to emphasise the role of women in his work for us, and to depict Christ and the people around Christ such that peoples from various backgrounds and cultures would be able to find themselves within the artworks.

During the December holidays, our new set of Stations of the Cross went up inside our chapel, where they can be viewed beginning at the bell pull next

to the vestry door, and ending with the last Station behind the piano next to the angel stained-glass window. They are beautiful, and have been well received by those who have viewed them to date.

It should be noted that our new and unique set forms the third set in our school. In the 1990s, then-headmistress Judith Brown put up a set of prints of the Stations, identical to those in St Mary's DSG in Pretoria. These replaced the black-and-white set of Stations that had been up in the chapel. Both these sets have now been hung along the corridor on the upper level just above the Senior School reception, between the accounts offices and the Ross & Darragh classrooms.

Over the coming weeks, the chaplain's message in both the Junior and Senior School newsletters will focus on individual Stations of the Cross.
