FROM THE HEAD'S DESK

Former United States president Barack Obama delivered a lecture in South Africa this year in honour of Nelson Mandela, which holds significant lessons for us as educators and parents. His speech often turned to the competing narratives of hope and fear. These narratives permeate our daily lives and we are bombarded by talk that seems to reject the concept of objective truth. To counter the noisy and muddled messages of the media and social media for our girls, it becomes even more important to pay attention to a foundational education built on strong and sound values and principles.

I believe that Barack Obama's words support our vision of education for the girls at St Mary's School.

"Let me tell you what I believe," he said. "I believe in a vision of equality and justice and freedom and multi-racial democracy, built on the premise that all

people are created equal, and they're endowed by our creator with certain inalienable rights. And I believe that a world governed by such principles is possible and that it can achieve more peace and more cooperation in pursuit of a common good. That's what I believe."

This message is echoed in our school's values of love, community and integrity, and it is a message of hope which we should emphasise for our children.

FROM THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD, NIGEL CARMAN

On Tuesday 13 November, the school hosted an end-of-year Board and staff function.

Nigel Carman, chairperson of the Board, presented the following speech:

"In case you haven't noticed, it's November already, though it seems like only yesterday that we were gathered for this occasion in November 2017. Time flies, and seems to be flying faster and faster every year.

We are living in increasingly hard and uncertain times. As ordinary decent South Africans we all struggle with the issues and challenges which present themselves on a daily basis. It is a difficult, though beautiful, country in which we all live and work. The school is not insulated from the stresses and strains of the outside world.

As teachers at St Mary's you have a duty to the girls in your care, a sacred trust. Speaking on behalf of the Board, we are filled with appreciation for the commitment and effort and skill that you bring and have brought through the year in discharging this duty. That you have chosen to join this endeavour fills us with confidence for the future.

From the Board point of view, I wish to report that Rob Dow and Azar Jammine have retired as of this evening. This marks perhaps the beginning of a new era in the life of the Board.


Rob Dow joined the Board in October 2002. In those days, he was a parent in the school and lived in Johannesburg. More recently, he moved to Cape Town but still made the effort to arrange his affairs so that he could be in Johannesburg for Board meetings. Rob brought a keen insight into and understanding of the financial affairs of the school and the financial sustainability of the school. He was one of the moving spirits in the review which led to the establishment of the Foundation. His understanding of financing and cash flow encouraged the Board to take on the massive project that was The Edge.

Azar Jammine joined the Board in August 2003. He is the husband of an Old Girl, past parent and now grandparent. As an economist, Azar brought to the deliberations of the Board a keen foresight and an understanding of the economic conditions in which the school operates and in which its parents live and work. Azar reminded us from time to time that the size of the school and the number of pupils mattered, and that our ethos demanded a particular approach to budgets and the setting of fees. With Rob Dow, it was largely Azar's call that the timing for the construction of The Edge could not have been better.


