From the head girl

In the last newsletter I wrote about some of the school traditions I have experienced this year. I mentioned the importance of our core values and the strength of our community.

Last week, the head girls ran a chapel service in which we expanded on this idea. We spoke on the theme of respect and tolerance, explaining to the girls why it is important to be integrated and tolerant of other religions and cultures in our diverse society. St Mary's places us in an environment which exposes us to many different cultures and religions, and encourages us to learn about and engage with them.

I also spoke to the girls about my experience coming to the school from a Jewish perspective, and how this exposure has shaped me as a person.

I introduced them to the Jewish concept of "Tikkun Olam" "Repairing the World". This teaching deals with the responsibilities given to people and their effect on their community and society as a whole. In playing our part to repair the world and making a difference together, we must learn how to work with one another, and try to understand one another's world views even if they are not our own.

Through forums such as GIRLS, the diversity committee and, for some, confirmation classes or chapel, we can learn and make a difference. The service ended with an apt Hebrew phrase from Psalm 133: "Hineh ma tov u'ma-nayim, shevet achim gam yachad" - How good and pleasant it is for us to sit together.

e4 Workers' Museum

Newtown is synonymous with inner-city regeneration, a vibrant nightlife and the Sci-Bono Discovery Centre, among many other things. Last week the Form I girls visited the Workers' Museum and added a different layer to their definition and perception of Newtown by stepping back in time and examining the economic, social and political forces that shaped Johannesburg.

The Workers' Museum, built in 1913, is at the Newtown Compound, which is one of the last surviving examples of the original municipal compounds for black male workers. As part of the e⁴ curriculum, the Form I girls had the opportunity to explore the Workers' Museum, looking at various themes such as: Change and Continuity, Life on the Compounds, Systems of Power and Control on the Compounds and the Impact of the Migrant System. This exploration was learner-centred and allowed the girls to construct their own knowledge with minimal teacher involvement or influence. The girls initially found this uncomfortable, continually seeking direction from their teachers, however, as the day progressed they became more comfortable with their ability to analyse and interpret material around them and share their findings and interpretations with their peers.

The day was filled with numerous co-operative learning opportunities, where the girls were able to teach and learn from one another. The highlight throughout the day was being able to see our girls walk through the domestic quarters, lock-up room, the showers and urinal room and the migrant workers' story room and be observant, contemplative and empathetic towards those who had lived under such conditions



Working in teams

The girls gathered photographs, sound clips, video clips and recorded in writing what they saw, heard, perceived and discussed with their peers. This information will be used to create a virtual museum of the Workers' Museum, using skills that they have learnt during recent Information Technology lessons. This will give others an opportunity to view and experience the Workers' Museum from our girls' eyes. This outing gave our girls an opportunity to contrast their observations and experiences with our Northwards Mansion visit.

I hope that the girls will begin to understand the complexity of our history and take great pride in using the skills they have acquired throughout the course of the year in order to analyse our past, contextualise it and empathetically seek solutions to problems that are rooted in our history.
