### FROM THE CHAPLAIN

"People come to kneel where prayer has been valid," wrote T.S. Eliot.

Whenever we celebrate or observe a high holy day at school, such as Ash Wednesday, Eliot's words come to mind. The chapel is a sermon preached through art, bricks and cement. Eliot's words, written many years ago, seem to be a fitting commentary on this sacred space. We gather in our chapel because we sense that here, prayer has been valid. In its 70 years, the walls have been saturated with the prayers of all the people who have found God in our chapel.

As Eliot writes: "You are not here to verify, instruct yourself, or inform curiosity or carry report. You are here to kneel where prayer has been valid. And prayer is more than an order of words, the conscious occupation of the praying mind, or the sound of the voice praying."



He writes from his personal experience of his encounters with God. He knows what it means to be in a sacred place, to be overcome by (and filled with) the presence of God. There is a story told about Eliot's visit to the Society of Saint John the Evangelist's community chapel. It was an early morning Eucharist in the 1930s, during the consecration of the elements, he suddenly experienced the presence of God so powerfully, so heavily, that Eliot not only kneeled, but he also fully collapsed onto the floor of the chapel.

The various statues, stained glass windows and paintings are all reminders, that in this place, our school chapel, the transcendent God has broken into our time-bound world, and we can point to where it happened.

# THE IMPORTANCE OF EMERGENCY DRILLS

Emergency drills are essential in ensuring people know what to do in the event of an emergency. St Mary's held evacuation and stay-in-doors drills on 1 March and 6 March, respectively. They are designed to test the preparedness in responding to a crisis and to identify areas that require improvement.

Both drills were successful, and the Senior School girls responded well. We will conduct regular drills to ensure that both staff and the girls are prepared to handle such emergencies, which can help prevent/reduce injuries, save lives and handle a crisis effectively.

To raise awareness amongst our girls, conversations around the importance of emergency drills and activities designed to reflect realistic scenarios and challenges will be conducted in the mentor groups to understand better how to react quickly and effectively during emergencies.

We are aware that all our girls have mobile devices, and in the event of a real emergency, the girls are most likely to contact parents and guardians as the events unfold. We urge all parents and guardians to refer to the St Mary's School app, where official and accurate communication from the school will be sent in such an event.

### FROM THE DRAMA DEPARTMENT

The "Bennies Phyzz Bootcamp" was held on the 18 and 19 of February. This workshop was run by Bailey Snyman, an internationally recognised name on the subject of physical theatre and put together by Mr Kailin Pillay - head of Dramatic Arts at St Benedict's School.

The workshop introduced and explored exactly what physical theatre is and included warm ups pieces from Mr Snyman and rehearsed choreography. This was a completely new experience for me.

Physical theatre is not simply dance or gymnastics. It is never movement just for the sake of movement. Every move on stage has a purpose and communicates something to the audience.

We formed groups, our task was to create a phrase of 20 or so movements, that we would later use to form our own piece. From there, we split our phrase into assisted duets and trios. Performing these assisted phrases and discussing our intention of the piece and the mood we aimed to set, was where our first day concluded.

#### FENCES-DRAMATHEATRE TRIP REVIEW

On Wednesday 22 February, the Drama students had the opportunity to watch a magnificent production of *Fences* at the Joburg Theatre. This was a wonderful experience and the performance was captivating.

The story follows the life of Troy Maxson: a father, husband and former baseball player who lives in Pittsburgh with his family during the 1950's. The play skillfully tackles issues of racism and existentialism through Troy's life at home as he wonders what life he could have led if he lived in a world of equality. Troy resents white people for his unsuccessful career as a baseball player and as a result directs that resentment towards his family. Furthering the enthralling storyline, the play also introduces the theme of the unequal power dynamic between men and women and shows this through his marriage to Rose.

Being able to observe a group of talented, black South African actors who completely absorb into their respective characters and convey the message intended by the original playwright, August Wilson, was an honour. The play was incredibly cathartic and had an impact on all the students, which was clearly seen in the conversations between the students after the production. I would highly recommend that people make time to watch this incredible production as I have no doubt that it will be a worthwhile experience.

Developer, Brian Green bought the dilapidated factories and surrounding buildings into a community-based space which serves the people of the surrounding areas with initiatives such as fruit and vegetable garden, entrepreneurship opportunities, educational and after-school services, with the community at the heart of it.

From Victoria Yards, we made our way to the Central Business District (CBD), where we viewed classroom concepts such as urban blight and decay. As we drove through the CBD, we watched the area transform into Maboneng, a place renewed by art and colour. Our first stop in Maboneng was Arts on Main. 
The divers then acquitted themselves well at their inter-high and took second place. This effort saw St Mary's win the Overall Shield for the team with the highest score from the swimming and the diving.





#### LOST PROPERTY

On a disappointing note, the lost property in the Senior School is out of control. The first disturbing factor is the amount of clothing that is unnamed or still has the previous owner's name still on. 


