The Independent Schools Association of Southern Africa (ISASA) publishes a quarterly magazine Independent Education, which presents articles on research and trends in education and showcases specific work in schools. It provides some pleasant and inspirational reading for teachers.

I was browsing through the latest edition last week and I was not surprised to come across several articles on mental health. This is currently a focus for all schools as we experience increased levels of anxiety and stress in young people.

In the same edition of Independent Education, certain programmes and webinars were promoted with the intention of helping children achieve their desired success. The phrases: develop a purpose, plan a path, prepare for the route were repeated continually in the promotion.

These programmes encourage children to map out the years at school - to set goals and to plan each step on the path to their desired outcomes.

The message for our children is that there is little space in childhood and adolescence for languid exploration of interests, for play and recreation, for spontaneity and the formation of self. Everything we know to be normal. Rather, education and in fact everything, must be clearly defined and deliberately planned for one's ultimate success.

It concerns me that the obsession with achievement and success is causing the decline in our children's mental health and well-being.

FROM THE CHAPLAIN

Writing on why South Africa should observe Remembrance Day, Allan Sinclair writes:

As a comparatively young country which permitted only a small segment of its population to bear arms, South Africa nevertheless made significant contributions to the Allied causes in both world wars and in the Korean War.

On Tuesday, we held our Remembrance Day chapel. Churches and schools in South Africa have war memorials to remember those of their communities who served and died in the two World Wars. In her reflection, Ms Dingle spoke of the importance of memory and remembering and encouraging us to remember those who have died in the two World Wars and those who have been killed in the many wars and uprisings since then.

Christian communities played a significant role during and after the war, offering pastoral care to families and being part of rebuilding communities. The school website records the following incident on how St Mary's was affected following the end of the First World War and responded:

In the last months of the war, many thousands of South Africans of all races succumb to Spanish influenza. The pandemic, one of the worst human disasters ever, kills up to 6% of the global population. The particularly virulent H1N1 flu strain spreads to every corner of the globe, assisted by the return of millions of soldiers who had participated in the world war. South Africa is not spared. St Mary's School looks like a hospital, as every bed is filled by those fighting for their lives.

In these difficult times, when some St Mary's fathers have perished alongside the millions of others, when communities and economies around the world have been devastated and South Africa slides into a post-war depression, St Mary's College is not spared and fights for its very survival.

As St Paul writes to the Corinthians: And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

Form II alternative endings

In Form II, our literary focus this term was on how short story writers, using an economy of words, are able to write compelling tales which continue to captivate the imaginations of new readers. We read Roald Dahl's well-known, darkly twisted *Lamb to the Slaughter* and Can Themba's popular and regularly adapted, menacing psychological narrative *The Suit*. Instead of asking our students to respond to these texts by answering technical questions on plot, structure, character and theme in a formal assessment, we asked them to engage dialogically with the writers and provide their own endings to these renowned stories. The majority of the families in our Ikusasa Lethu Programme have a combined household income of less than R5000 per month. A pair of school shoes can cost between R240 and R600 and a *Casio* scientific calculator is now R395 and compulsory for all learners.

ED-ADMIN PARENT PORTAL
