FROM THE LIFE SCIENCES DEPARTMENT

On Thursday 5 October, the (Form IV) Life Sciences girls completed a practical in preparation for the final IEB Practical Assessment Task that will take place in 2024. Their practical investigated the ability of bromothymol blue Indicator to detect different concentrations of ethanol in a milk solution. The girls were assigned the intricate task of performing a ten-fold serial dilution to create different concentrations of ethanol in the milk samples before adding bromothymol blue Indicator. Colour changes of blue, green and yellow in the respective solutions represented the amount of ethanol present in each milk sample. Throughout the practical, the girls were assessed on their ability to follow instructions in the method provided to them, as well as measuring various solutions using the correct apparatus with care and precision. While this is a vital assessment in Life Sciences which is completed under test conditions, the girls always embrace the challenge have fun in the process.







During the Wednesday morning cultural session, the Form II girls have been assigned the task of crafting a recyclable and eco-friendly parachute. The project's objective is to design a parachute that can take the longest to reach the ground when dropped from the second floor of the Desmond Tutu Science Block.

While completing this project, the girls will develop two extremely important twenty-first century skills - collaborative problem solving and effective communication, thus preparing them for an ever-changing work and school environment.
