FROM THE HEAD'S DESK

On Monday, we held an assembly that focused on the recipients of academic and sporting significance. It was a privilege to acknowledge three St Mary's girls who have achieved international success in rowing, and the many many St Mary's girls who achieved in the English Olympiad and as a group, set new standards of achievement for schools.

Such assemblies are a joy to lead but they also challenge me - on the one hand I want to applaud and celebrate the excellence of the recipients of awards, and on the other hand, I want to reassure the girls who are not being recognised but who have participated and contributed to enhance our school ethos. What does emerge from such occasions and what I did emphasise at the assembly, is the value of 'lift' that exists in such a performing environment.

What I failed to mention to the girls was that I had read a column by Jo Ellison, columnist, in the FT Weekend, where she praised sore losers. She was reflecting on Aryna Sabalenka's rage after losing the US Open to Coco Gauff. What was a private outburst for Sabalenka, was captured on camera and then went viral. Ellison writes, "Recognising our limitations may not be the most fashionable of sentiments in this era of Nike-esque exhortations to live the dream ... less popularly communicated is how much work, hardship and disappointment fulfilling that dream might actually entail." She ends by saying that failure or things not going your way can be used to advantage and, "can be a strangely motivating tool."

I failed to explore such sentiment in the assembly - I am hoping that the girls will read this message.

To end this week, we hosted our chapel gathering and assembly with a focus on Heritage Day, where we acknowledged and celebtated the value of learning in a diverse community.

FROM THE CHAPLAIN

In Romans 13: 8, 10-12, St Paul writes to the church in Rome saying:

⁸ Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another, for whoever loves others has fulfilled the law. ¹⁰ Love does ^{no} harm to a neighbour. Therefore, love is the fulfilment of the law. ¹¹ And do this, understanding the present time: The hour has already come for you to wake up from your slumber, because our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. ¹² The night is nearly over; the day is almost here. So let us put aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armour of light

St Paul's message in the above passage can be summed up in the Sesotho word *botho*. *Botho* refers to having a spirit of fellowship, co-operation, selflessness, compassion, tolerance, respect and sharing (Nkomazana 2014). As a South African school, our values encapsulate this spirit of *botho*. Remember that living these values is a measure of the individual's contribution to community life.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE OXBRIDGE ACADEMIC PROGRAM


Cambridge Tradition Program

FIV GEOGRAPHY TRIP TO HARTBEESPOORT DAM



FORM III IEB PROBLEM-SOLVING CHALLENGE

On Thursday 14 September, the Form IIIs participated in the IEB Collaborative Problem-Solving Challenge. This challenge is a learning experience, developed by the IEB for secondary school learners. It requires the application of collaborative problem-solving skills to resolve complex problems. The aim of the exercise is to challenge learners to apply both their teamwork skills and ingenuity to develop a set of solutions to given problems that fall within the National Development Plan goals.

The theme for the challenge this year was "A New Type of Learning: Artificial Intelligence in Education". Teams, grouped at random and consisting of IEB pupils from throughout South Africa, were tasked with addressing a series of questions based on AI in education. The questions dealt with such issues as:

- The ethical concerns around AI tools in education
- A critical analysis of issues around the current system of education and whether schools are adequately preparing students for a world of pervasive AI integration
- The development of creative solutions aimed at incorporating AI effectively into the educational experience
- How AI will impact both the school community as well as the wider community

The girls spent five hours in the Wantage Centre communicating digitally with their allocated groups. While it seemed that the group work element of the task was the most challenging part of the day, the girls thoroughly enjoyed grappling with the given scenarios and produced excellent and thought-provoking solutions to the given problems.

Below, please find details as to how to access the Ed-Admin StMary's parent portal:

- You will require a Parent ID whenever signing into the parent portal. If you are unsure of your Parent ID, please email portal@stmary.co.za, with both your and your daughter's names and surnames, for assistance.
- To access the St Mary's parent portal, please visit the school website on www.stmarysschool.co.za and click on the portal login on the top right of the page.
- Enter in your Parent ID and choose 'forgot password'. Please ensure that you enter the email address that St Mary's has on record and enter in the CAPTCHA code.
- You will then receive an email. Once received, click on the link in order to setup your password. Choose a secure password. You will then receive another email to confirm your password has been changed. You can now proceed to log into the portal.
