# FROM THE VISUAL ARTS DEPARTMENT

On Friday 19 May, the Form III Visual Art students visited the Origins Centre, a museum that celebrates the history of hominin innovation that began over **two** million years ago. The museum also delves into the fascinating beliefs of **T**he San. The girls were given a tour by Dr Tammy Hodgskiss, an archaeologist. They were taught about ancient African stone tools, carbon dating, the oldest human remains **discovered to date in South Africa, the sacred Trance dance and \*Ochre rock paintings. At the end of** the tour, the girls were given the opportunity to try their hand at creating their own rock art by grinding down **O**chre pieces and creating artwork with their new paints.

The consensus from the girls **was** that the experience was mind-blowing **and it** was fascinating to learn about the history of our home from an artistic perspective. This trip was a hands-on effort towards learning of content **for the** quickly approaching theory examination. The girls thoroughly enjoyed the excursion and would gladly return on short notice.

On Saturday 20 May, our debating teams achieved spectacular results in the Atheneum Saturday League Break Rounds.

Two senior and two junior teams entered the tournament. We had a team in each category comprising mainly of girls who only joined debating this year. One team in each category broke into the quarter finals. The junior breaking team, Thabisile Dube (Form I), Jemma Tresling (Form II) and Owami Msomi (Form I), debated extremely well, and Jemma and Owami went on to place 3<sup>rd</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> respectively in the overall rankings - a very impressive result.

The senior breaking team, Danika Neuhoff (Form V), Francesca Lewitton (Form IV), Juhi Baboolal (Form III), Reitumetse Molapo (Form III) and Hayley Laithwaite (Form V) went on to win the senior category in a final against Rhodesfield Engineering School. # BEYOND THE CLASSROOM: EXCHANGES, THE OXBRIDGE ACADEMIC PROGRAM AND IMMERSION TOURS

We have partnerships with the following schools:

- •India, Auckland House School in Shimla: this reciprocal exchange takes place in June (India) and January (South Africa)
- •UK, Framlingham hockey exchange: this reciprocal sport exchange occurs in the third term (UK) and second term (South Africa) •UK, Sherborne Girls: this reciprocal exchange takes place in January (UK) and June (South Africa)
- •Switzerland Kloster Disentis: this reciprocal exchange takes place in January (Switzerland) and in October (South Africa)
- •Germany Hans-Sachs Gymnasium Nürnburg: this reciprocal exchange takes place in December (Germany)and February (South Africa) •Ghana cultural visit to St Mary's Senior High School in Ghana: we are hoping to visit in September

#### French exchange programme:

At the end of the Form IV year, St Mary's offers a French exchange programme, which runs completely separately from the rest of the school's exchanges. This means that girls may still apply for any other school exchange and will still be able to apply for the French exchange as long as she is studying French at St Mary's.

#### The Oxbridge Academic Program:

Every year, a cohort of Form II and Form III pupils attend The Oxbridge Academic Program convened by World Strides. Our pupils choose academically demanding university-like subjects, which then informs their decisions of whether to attend Cambridge or Oxford University. The Programs run for two or four weeks in July, depending on personal preference and structure of the courses.

#### The 2024 Cambodia expedition:

This expedition is a life-changing adventure where girls have the added responsibility of earning part or all of their place on the expedition, by fundraising. Whilst in Cambodia they will also take on a variety of different roles including cooking for themselves, taking part in a trek, leading the team, and managing their group budget. This expedition will happen in April 2024.

Signing out (and in again) procedure for Senior School girls during school hours

For the protection of your daughters, St Mary's insists that, should a girl need to leave school during school academic time for a valid reason e.g., orthodontist appointment, a parent/ guardian must fill out an exit slip. Exit slips can be found on the school app.

Before leaving school, girls must collect a hard copy of the exit slip from the Senior School reception office. This exit slip must be signed by a member of the Senior School management team. No girl will be allowed to leave the campus without a signed exit slip.

Upon returning to school during school academic time, girls must first report to the Senior School reception before going to class.

It is imperative that the school always knows the whereabouts of your daughters during school academic time, hence we request the above procedures be adhered to at all times.



# ED-ADMIN PARENT PORTAL

Below, please find details as to how to access the Ed-Admin St Mary's parent portal:

- You will require a Parent ID whenever signing into the parent portal. If you are unsure of your Parent ID, please email <u>portal@stmary.co.za</u>, with both your and your daughter's names and surnames, for assistance.
- To access the **StMary's** parent portal, please visit the school website on www.stmarysschool.co.za and click on the portal login on the top right of the page.
- Enter in your Parent ID and choose 'forgot password'. Please ensure that you enter the email address that St Mary's has on record and enter in the CAPTCHA code.
- You will then receive an email. Once received, click on the link inorder to set up your password. Choose a secure password. You will then receive another email to confirm your password has been changed. You can now proceed to log into the portal.
