

FROM THE CHAPLAIN

In his writing, St Paul refers to sports activity to highlight the spirit of courage demanded by the Christian life. In 1 Corinthians 9:24-26, the metaphor is extended from running to other games, such as boxing, to make the point that winning a prize requires discipline, self-control, and co-ordinated activity.

²⁴ Surely you know that many runners take part in a race, but only one of them wins the prize. Run, then, in such a way as to win the prize. ²⁵ Every athlete in training submits to strict discipline, in order to be crowned with a wreath that will not last; but we do it for one that will last forever. ²⁶ That is why I run straight for the finish line; that is why I am like a boxer who does not waste his punches. ²⁷ I harden my body with blows and bring it under complete control, to keep myself from being disqualified after having called others to the contest (1 Corinthians 9:24-26, GNT).

For the people of Corinth, this message would have resonated. They were part of the Greek world and familiar with Greek literature and philosophy. In the Greek education system, sports were of educative and formative value. They (the ancient Greeks) asked one simple question: how will this type of training help me develop the virtues to live a good life? The training was then structured in such a way that it would help a person build excellence of character, endurance, courage, and strength of will.

Paul transformed the Greek view of learning by rooting the formation of human character in the image of Jesus. Jesus, who in his sacred humanity so often touched others through his own body with a gaze, an embrace, or the healing touch of his hands, is the reason why our dancing, our playing, and our training have value. In placing our hand on the back of a friend getting ready to play a sport and in speaking a word of encouragement to her, we are touching a mystery that finds its ultimate meaning in the mystery of Jesus Christ himself, true God and true man (Burgis 2015), thus, showing how all human actions can be redemptive.

We extend our prayers to Lunathi Mdlungu's family and friends as they mourn her passing. May you find peace and comfort in this time of loss.

May Lunathi's soul, and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

FROM THE LIBRARY

The purpose of your school library

Schools exist to educate children and young people. Our aim at St Mary's is to provide resources to directly support the curriculum. The library staff are here to teach information and critical literacy skills to become independent learners. The library staff will make it as easy as possible to make users aware of resources, whether that is by teaching retrieval skills in subject-related lessons or by giving one-on-one instruction in response to an enquiry.

In a curated collection tailored not only to the curriculum in any school, but also to the age and abilities of the student community and the school staff, the library offers a greater number and range of material than users would otherwise have access to. These resources can be in any medium (physical books, e-books, audio books, online magazines, journals, articles, news, resources - to name a few!). They may display the material on the shelves, on screens, via bookmarks or in subject guides, printed and digital. An online library management system accessible from anywhere 24/7 enables library staff to make this carefully curated stock available, organised in ways that users can find what they need.

Below are the different areas where the resource centre supports your education:

Reading for pleasure

We promote reading for pleasure via a collection of books and e-books. Our catalogue is designed not only to increase literacy levels but also for your enjoyment. Your library staff will point you to titles tailored for your reading needs.

Research

Our research library has had tremendous growth over the years. The research library has been supplemented with online research databases. The library staff can assist you with your research journey. The online databases consist of NewsBank - a newspaper database with resources from around the world including South African newspapers; Britannica - online encyclopedias; J-Stor - peer reviewed open access articles. These are all curated on one platform to give a federated search option.

Shared space

Our school library is a space that extends to a social and cultural place to meet. It is a sanctuary free from judgement. Students can select their own reading choices.

Our aim

Our aim is to prepare girls for university. We need to teach our young people how to find information when they need to know. Our goal is to develop information literate students who are responsible with ethical values for society. According to IFLA, information literate students are competent self-directed learners who are aware of their information needs. They display confidence in their ability to solve problems. They know how to locate relevant and reliable information. (IFLA School Library Guidelines, IFLA, p7)

In conclusion, there are assorted reasons to have a school library. When supported, the difference can be significant. The Wantage resource centre does not sit within a single subject or year group, but can be felt across our campus. It is a space that forms part of the heart of the school. In the very fabric of the school.

SPACE EXPLORATION

Before diving into the first project of the year, I would like to take a minute to introduce you to Self-eSTEAM. We are a team of passionate educators who represent a range of subjects and believe fervently in the value of cross-curricular endeavours and establishing connections. Our inquiry-based learning is informed by the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals linking the learning to real-world issues. Our mission is to make learning relevant and to challenge students to think beyond the content. We are determined to find ways to ignite a curiosity about our world, to think critically, to evaluate successes and failures, and to use every opportunity to learn and grow.

The announcement of the South African National Space Agency's intention to set up a communication station in Matjiesfontein sparked an interesting debate. With so many variables associated with space exploration, the team realised this was a wonderful springboard for the Form IIs to grapple with the impact and possibilities of a 'Moon to Mars' mission. The students will have the opportunity to learn about the demands of human life and dare to conceive what a colony on Mars might look like. They will also, of course, be able to debate the ethical issues raised from the audacious move. Is there even a place for space exploration when Earth has so many challenges? Does human life deserve a second chance?

The range and scope of the project is astounding and so we hope to harness many cross-curricular opportunities. From a science and health perspective through to budget considerations and communication, the students will be able to practise research skills as well as data collection and analysis.

The end point will be a Dragon's Den-inspired pitch to a panel of experts, as well as to parents.


Our St Mary's invitational team improved with every match they played and showed great determination and team spirit throughout the festival.

During the December holidays, 15 Senior School girls and seven Junior School girls were selected to represent Central Gauteng (and one representing Eastern Gauteng) to play in the Schools Waterpolo South Africa (SWPSA) Inter-Provincial Tournament that took place in Durban. The tour was preceded by a prestigious capping ceremony where the girls were awarded their Gauteng Colours.

The tournament kicked off with an opening ceremony and was followed by two days of intense group stage games. A total of 10 swimming pools were used, 125 provincial teams entered spanning the five age categories - U19, U16, U15, U14 and U13. The three schools water polo powerhouses - Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal and Western Province largely dominated the podium placings; however it was encouraging to see super results from Eastern, Buffalo City and Nelson Mandela Bay among the U13/U14 age categories.

Our girls played with passion and determination and seven of the 14 girls came home with team medals: the U14A Central Gauteng girls winning gold and adding to their 2021 gold medal victory.

All these girls are congratulated and we look forward to an excellent year of St Mary's water polo in 2023.

NAG is a prestigious event where divers from various provinces compete annually for their diving clubs. NAG and RSA Cup have specific requirements and give the divers an opportunity to compete on 1m springboard, 3m springboard, platform and synchronized diving.

All the divers did exceptionally well and produced some impressive results. I would specifically like to congratulate Keratile Manaka as she received the overall trophy for the U16 age group. This means that she is ranked the number one U16 diver in the country.

From 27 November to 4 December 2022, Zalika Methula and Keratile Manaka represented South Africa at the FINA Word Junior Diving Championships which were held in Montreal, Canada.

Zalika competed in U18 on both the 1m and 3m springboards. She placed 30^{th} out of 43 divers on the 3m and 22^{nd} out of 43 divers on the 1m.

Keratile competed on the 1m springboard in the U16 age group and placed 26th out of 30 divers.

We would like to congratulate the girls on this impressive achievement.

IKUSASA LETHU MATRIC RESULTS

St Mary's is extremely proud to announce the matric results for our Ikusasa Lethu matrics of 2022. Our pass rate was 94.5%, with 78% achieving a Bachelor's Degree admission. This is an amazing achievement as the national pass rate for 2022 is 80.1% officially and 54.6% if one counts the learners who dropped out during the course of the year.



Top learner: **Raymond Mogano** achieved 6 distinctions, missing his 7th by 1%. He will be studying Actuarial Sciences at Wits this year.



Vutomi Chantal Baloyi achieved 5 distinctions (including 99% in Business Studies, and 91% in Accounting). She will be studying a Bachelor of Accounting at UJ this year.



Nhlengelo Khosa achieved 4 distinctions with a 79% average. She will be studying a BCom in Business Management at UJ this year.



Hlanganani Ndlovu achieved 1 distinction and over 70% in all subjects. He will be studying a BA at UJ.



Philela Vikwa achieved 1 distinction in Home Language and marks above 70 % for all other subjects. She will study Computer Sciences at UJ.



Kelebogile Modiba improved her marks in Grade 12 and received a distinction in English. All her marks (except Maths 64 %) are above 70 %. She will study Computers Sciences at UJ.

Special mention: Makgale Bobby Ramperi achieved 4 distinctions with an average of 78,57%. He will be studying Computer Sciences at UCT.

Other achievement of note: Tyron Mokoala improved his Maths mark from 31% at the end of Grade 11 to 69% in his finals.

As of August 2022, she moved to full time private practice, seeing patients from the Oxford Day Clinic as well as her own private practice in Melrose and Auckland Park where she sees adults and adolescents who present with a variety of psychological challenges.

Anele has a keen interest in working with eating disorders and is a director and shareholder at LinkedCare Consortium, a multidisciplinary team that provides mental healthcare services to individuals, families, and organisations - with specialised eating disorders experience.
