FROM THE HEAD'S DESK

It is regrettable that in the past week members of my management team have had to spend time on discipline issues. The majority of the behaviour difficulties and issues are aligned with international trends in teen behaviour; however, such behaviours pose a threat to the healthy development of our young people.

We believe that our ethos and expectations of behaviour at St Mary's are well entrenched in the school, supported by our community, and that our students are serious about self-development and individual goals. Our adolescents will experiment, and they will test boundaries, but it is our responsibility, as parents and teachers, to intervene and provide a path, as safe as possible, for them into the future. They must also learn about accountability from us, their significant adults.

I am disappointed that Form I and II parents did not attend the talk by Luke Lamprecht on social media in any significant numbers. This was a missed opportunity to collaborate with the school and your daughters to control access, interaction and addiction to social media.

I believe that access to the internet with its dark layers and to social media with its toxic socialisation is probably one of the most worrying aspects of raising children today.

Just as education unlocks potential and provides a creative and challenging experience for development; a structured, caring, supportive school environment provides students with clear expectations for exercising self-discipline, restraint, and commitment to their healthy and successful futures.

³ They said to me, "Those who survived the exile and are back in the province are in great trouble and disgrace. The wall of Jerusalem is broken down, and its gates have been burned with fire."

⁴ When I heard these things, I sat down and wept. For some days I mourned and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven (Nehemiah 1: 3-4)

Ms Dingle shared a reflection on the reading from Nehemiah and reminded us that sometimes, after receiving bad news, to sit down and weep is not such a bad thing. However, we should follow it up with action. Nehemiah was a man of action and, importantly, a community builder.

In the reading from Nehemiah, Ms Dingle suggested that we take time to reflect on our own brokenness and the brokenness of our community. It is our duty to be community builders: in our families, our friendship circles, our country and school community. God promises restoration and unity for his people:

8 "Remember the instruction you gave your servant Moses, saying, 'If you are unfaithful, I will scatter you among the nations, 9 but if you return to me and obey my commands, then even if your exiled people are at the farthest horizon, I will gather them from there and bring them to the place I have chosen as a dwelling for my Name.' (Nehemiah 1: 8-9)

We just need to listen, reflect, and be willing to build our relationships and our communities, with God's help.

Form V Geography urban tour

On Thursday 10 March, the matric girls set out on their urban tour of Johannesburg for their Geography focus day. The first stop was Victoria Yards to take a close look at inner city development, rejuvenation and gentrification. The girls were taken on a fascinating guided tour around Victoria Yards which included strolls through artisan studios and an immense vegetable garden which forms part of an urban agriculture project seeking to stimulate job creation and income-generating opportunities. After buying hot chocolate, croissants and sorbet from local vendors, the girls hopped back onto the bus and continued the tour through Maboneng and the Johannesburg CBD.

During this portion of the journey, the girls were exposed to examples of hijacked buildings and the many issues around urban blight. The settlement concepts taught in class came to life as the girls were able to appreciate the concepts of high land values, the transition zone and urban renewal. The bus then took the girls to 44 Stanley in Braamfontein, where, apart from the excellent shopping and delicious lunch that was happily (and rapidly) consumed, the girls were able to see tangible examples of facadism and functional magnetism. To conclude the day's journey, the bus drove through the Rosebank precinct where the girls kept an eye out for examples of urban greening and hostile architecture.

AFRIKAANS

The Afrikaans department invited Emma Bekker to talk to the Form III girls on Friday 18 March. Emma Bekker is a South African poet, writer, massage therapist and intuitive facilitator. Emma published a collection of poems called *Skryn* in 2015 and a collection of short stories, *Vel* in 2021.

She started by saying that women are close to her heart, and that she is fascinated by how we use the female narrative to change the world. Emma believes education empowers women.

1. Question: What are your first memories of writing and reading?

Growing up, our house was filled with books. My dad was a pastor, and my mom a trained teacher who supported my dad in his ministry. My mother read to me when I was little. There were many books in the house and I was allowed to read and handle the books. I was particularly drawn to a specific encyclopedia on people from other places. As a young girl, I played for hours and pretended to be a Japanese Geisha wearing a kimono and drew the Taj Mahal at the age of four.

I realized that the beauty of story-telling is that you can put on a different "skin" every time you write a story. You melt into the character and put on an extra skin. Stories became the place where I could forge an identity that wasn't so horrible.

My work is layered. I love the word "Lacuna", meaning unsaid things. Some things aren't necessarily spelled out but are implanted in a story.

2.Question: Tell us more about "andersoortigheid" or "otherness." What is your view of the difference between being an outsider and being different?

I was different from a young age and was not conventional in my ways of parenting. I see myself as unconventional in my thinking. When we search for our own identity, we sometimes feel different from the crowd or the norm, identifying as "the other" or "being original". I think there is pressure to conform and perform for many of you in senior school. senior school is a place where you can learn certain skills, but remember that it is a simulation of sorts for real life.

The magnesium flame is magnificent and illustrates "otherness". Magnesium burns at an intensity you can't ignore. It can't burn differently. It can't be ashamed of being a magnesium flame. It's not like a candle that can burn gently. So, we all burn differently. We have to learn where and how to pitch our energy or our flame. We have to embrace who we are. Otherwise, we can't use the gifts of our "otherness."

Certain kinds of trauma we work through in life transform us forever, and you realise that very few people can relate to what you've been through.

Think of the image of zebras on the savannah that stick together in a herd. When a white tiger approaches, they see each other's stripes and think they are the same, but they're not. When the white tiger tries to laugh at the zebras' jokes, out comes a very different sound and the zebras realise this is another animal. The zebras slowly and gently retreat, leaving the tiger on her own. This image shows why some of us might be scared of herds, why some of us are scared of certain people.

You have to find a story to help you fit in. Being the victim of your otherness is only your own mistake. It's not healthy to feel the victim. You have to rectify that if you want to have a happy life. Regardless of how much of an individual we are, we are all looking for a tribe and a place to be ourselves, where we are held and appreciated. Radical acceptance comes with being accepted and valued for who we are and not for our achievements.

3. Question: How do you see the modern woman? Do you write about women's empowerment? In what way do you see yourself as an empowered woman?

I am passionate about women's empowerment. I do feel empowered but it took me a long time to get there. Empowerment comes from two things for me: loving my own body and having gone through all kinds of 'education'. It's vital to understand the importance of educating yourself.

Embrace what is exquisitely beautiful and what is revolting and ugly. Put it into one space where those two things become magic. Magic means transformational experiences. A transformational experience is never just composed of one pretty beautiful thing. Bring opposites in, and that creates a beautiful, unexpected space and an awareness that is not predictable.

We took many life lessons from the talk and thoroughly appreciated and enjoyed Emma's intelligence and delightful sense of humour.

Sentle Magongwa, an up and coming junior finished 3rd in the U14 age group with her teammates Charlotte Bowden finishing 2nd and Amy Saunders finishing 1st. Tayla Giles finished 9th in the U15 section. Our U16 number 1 player and 1st team player, Megan Saunders, finished 1st in the tournament without dropping a single game the entire tournament. Lara Kent came in at 2nd in the U19 section, losing out to a strong opponent in the final. We are extremely proud to see many girls competing at a top level and representing the school in local tournaments.

The Joburg Girls' High School league took place this term with matches being played every Friday. This year, the girls showed great class and produced some outstanding results. The final results are as follows: the U19 team finished 2nd, just four points behind winners, Kingsmead. The U19 B team finished 2nd, narrowly losing out by two points to winners Kingsmead.
