On Sunday 5 June, the Christian church celebrated the feast of Pentecost. One of the principal readings for this day was Acts 2: 1-21.

⁵ Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. 6 When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard their own language being spoken.⁷ Utterly amazed, they asked: "Aren't all these who are speaking Galileans?" Then how is it that each of us hears them in our native language?⁹ Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, [b] ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome ¹¹ (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs-we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!"¹² Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?" (Acts 2: 5-12, NIV)

The St Mary's squash 1st team recently participated in the Joburg Top Schools' tournament on the Friday 27 May and Saturday 28 May. This tournament is played to determine the best squash school in Johannesburg. The team consisted of Tayla Rohana, Sasha Steyn, Megan Saunders, Lara Kent, Amy Saunders and Charlotte Bowden.

St Mary's managed to win their first two rounds, defeating Roedean (5-0) and St Stithians (4-1). The determining fixture for the winner was played against a strong Kingsmead side which St Mary's narrowly managed to win 3-2. The girls are currently preparing for the SA Top Schools' tournament which takes place in July. This tournament will see the 1st team compete against the best schools from various provinces in the country.

SWIMMING

Swimmer achievements

It has been remiss of me not to highlight the achievements of St Mary's top swimmers who give up hours of their time to train with their various coaches and clubs, since the end of the school swimming season.

Three of our girls, Olivia Krüger, Marie Ella Maske and Grace Morris were selected to represent the Gauteng Schools' team at the SA Schools' swimming championships. In the U15 age group, Grace Morris ended with four individual gold medals (100m backstroke, 100m freestyle, 200m individual medley and 50m freestyle), a silver medal for the 200m backstroke as well as three relay gold medals.

In the U16 age-group, Marie Ella Maske achieved two individual silver medals (50m breast and 50m backstroke), one bronze medal (100m backstroke) and a relay gold medal.

In the Open age group, Olivia Krüger achieved two individual golds (200m individual medley and 50m freestyle), one individual silver (100 freestyle) and two relay gold medals.

Kimberly and Sally-Louise Ingwe both swam for Botswana at the Cana Zone IV championships.

Paige Edmundson qualified to swim at Level 3.

Kimberly Ingwe and Juliette Van Vught qualified to swim at the Junior Regional Championships.

A number of girls qualified to swim at nationals and the age group nationals gala:

- Emma Franck qualified to swim senior nationals and, although she did not make any finals, she swam a personal best time of 27,53 in the 50m freestyle, a sub-one minute in the 100m freestyle and an excellent time of 31,79 in the 50m breaststroke

 - o 3rd (bronze medal) in 100m breastroke
 - o 6th place in finals of 200m breastroke
- Marie Ella Maske made finals in the following events in the 15 year old age group:

 - o 50m backstroke
- o 50m breaststroke
- Grace Morris achieved the following in the 15 year old age group:
 - o 4th in 50m backstroke
 - o 5th in 100m backstroke
 - o 5th in 200m backstroke
 - o 5th in 200m freestyle
- Hannah Rigby made finals in the following events in the 15 year old age group:
 - o 200m individual medley
 - o 400m individual medley
 - o At the EGA awards ceremony, she was awarded her district colours and she also received awards for beating the district age group records in 400m freestyle, 400m individual medley and the 800m freestyle.
- Isabelle Barrow and Olivia Krüger qualified in the 16 year old age group but, owing to being in the 1st hockey team and playing in the St Mary's Hockey Festival, they chose to swim at regionals only

MUSE MORNING

Muse Mornings and parents' conversations are the brainchild of the Open Door department. The initiative stemmed from a need in our community for a platform where our parents could engage with professionals from outside the school on issues that are of relevance to the development of their children.

The original meaning of the word "muse" means to ponder, reflect or to absorb in thought. This has been and continues to be the sole aim of our Muse Mornings: to offer parents a platform where they can grapple with the issues involving child rearing and development on their own, with others and with the guidance of knowledgeable professionals.

Muse Mornings have been held over many years. We have invited a wide range of speakers on extensive topics, some of which have been suggested by our parent body. We have engaged with psychologists from different fields, a gynaecologist, dietician and physiotherapist.

Some of the topics which have been addressed in the past are:

- how to raise your daughters in a masculine world
- helping your daughter develop a healthy relationship with food
- and many conversations around anxiety in children and strategies to help them manage anxiety

A gynaecologist was invited to speak with our fathers on how to have conversations with their daughters about their changing bodies and we are proud that our fathers arrived en masse for the talk. In the last two years of the pandemic, our speakers have targeted their conversations at supporting parents in helping their children to navigate the emotional challenges which arose out of the pandemic.

Muse Mornings are held once a term in the mornings from 07h30 - 08h30. Please look out for newsletters and the school app for the notification of the next exciting presentation. We look forward to engaging with our parents, appreciate their input and welcome any topics that they believe will be of benefit to our community.

Getting back into the swing of things post-Covid means being allowed back onto campus to watch and support several events, whether these be sporting events, a school play, a music concert, etc. It also means a lot of organising to get your daughter where she needs to be and when she needs to be there!

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 Open the St Mary's App on your phone. Click on the "School calendars" icon. 	 Click on Live Calendar. Check it will save to your calendar and click "Add" to never miss a thing!

ED-ADMIN

St Mary's uses a school management information system called Ed-Admin to distribute termly school reports and to provide parents with an opportunity to inspect and amend personal information recorded in our database.

Below, please find details as to how to access the Ed-Admin St Mary's parent portal:

• You will require a Parent ID whenever signing into the parent portal. If you are unsure of your Parent ID, please email portal@stmary. co.za with both your and your daughter's names and surnames for assistance.

• To access the St Mary's parent portal, please click on the link below or visit the school website on <u>www.stmarysschool.co.za</u> and click on the portal login on the top right of the page. <u>https://stmarysw.ed-space.net/pparentportal.cfm</u>

• Enter in your Parent ID and choose 'forgot password'. Please ensure that you enter the email address that St Mary's has on record and enter in the CAPTCHA code.

• You will then receive an email. Once received, click on the link in order to set up your password. Choose a secure password. You will then receive another email to confirm your password has been changed. You can now proceed to log into the portal.
