

During this same week, on a visit to Little Saints who are on campus, I was captivated by the rich learning, the happy engagement of the children and teachers, and the privilege of this environment, which contrasts so starkly with the experiences of the majority of children in South Africa. The juxtaposition of an experience at St Mary's with that of the broader experience beyond our gates has permeated my whole week.

I was grateful to a colleague who shared with me the messages between ordinary citizens who began mobilising on social media to volunteer their help in cleaning up after the mess that was left in the aftermath of looting. This show of citizenship was reinforced on local TV stations that showed citizens taking back their streets and cleaning up. The actions of ordinary people and the spirit of community were extraordinary. Mandela Day, and its call to action suddenly took on new meaning for me.

When we are overwhelmed with emotion, it is easy to lose ourselves and turn to anger and despair but what matters is how we react.

ENDURANCE INSPIRED BY HOPE

1 Thessalonians 1:3

We remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labour prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.

Faith, hope, and love are a common theme throughout religious writings. They slide glibly off the tongue but perhaps it is a good time to reexamine these and reflect on their significance.

So much of what has been demanded of us in the last 18 months has drawn on our faith. We have needed to show faith in our medical experts and by extension those in power. We have trusted that those around us have done their best to protect themselves and those around them. You have put your faith in the school to find a way to continue with your daughter's education. We have also needed to return to our faith in God. We have been reminded that it is not through our strength but through God's that we can weather this storm.

Love is evident in our community. The support and love shown to families who have lost loved ones has been remarkable. The unfailing generosity of all has made a difference in so many people's lives - whether it be making sandwiches, creating care packages, baking muffins, or connecting with people who are isolated. A consequence of the last 18 months has been a reduction in tolerance as we have forgotten how to be in relationship with each other. Our country seems to be rife with war and disaster and love frequently feels absent. God asks us to love unconditionally, not just

our families, but all people. Each small act of love - a hug (in your bubble), an extra R5 for a car guard, an email or sms to someone you have not connected with for a while - counteracts the seeming wave of negativity we feel.

I have left "endurance inspired by hope" until last. Some years ago, Angela Duckworth and her associates at the university of Pennsylvania brought the idea of 'grit' to the forefront - this is not a new idea - Francis Dalton and before him Aristotle referred to "tenacity" and wondered about the human ability to access hidden depths. Teachers frequently talk about grit. We wonder if we encourage the development of this in our students and ourselves. Covid-19 and the recent unrest seen in our country has tested our "grit". I do believe that what keeps us going at St Mary's is our "endurance inspired by hope". Simply interacting with the girls whether it be in person (which is always preferable) or online inspires us with hope. From this pandemic and this past week's terrible destructive behaviour, many seeds have been sown for a future that looks different. It is our children who will have the power to bring this to fruition. God has set the example for us - it is through hope - that we will survive this, not just survive, but prosper.



SELF-ESTEAM: HIDDEN FIGURES


The Form Is completed their first self-eSTEAM project on Friday 9 July. It was a whirlwind experience as we condensed an eight-day interactive project with outings and guest speakers into a five-day research task with webinars and online quests.

The inspiration for this project came from the 2016 film *Hidden Figures*. This biographical drama follows the story of a team of female African-American mathematicians who served a vital role in NASA during the early years of the U.S. space programme (IMDb) without much regard or recognition. Our starting point or essential question was: *Can you identify and research a woman in Africa who has made a significant contribution to society and who inspires you to make a difference in your community?*

The women selected as research subjects by the individual students ranged from Marsha Cox to Zozibini Tunzi, and from political stalwarts to environmental activists. What a privilege to be reminded of the fantastic wealth of talent, ingenuity, determination and passion of the women in Africa! Most special of all were the students who wrote about the 'real' hidden figures that work tirelessly within their communities without much praise or recognition. It was wonderful to be able to honour these women and to share their stories.

Many of these biographical stories, along with illustrations and embedded videos, will be shared on our digital library platform to be enjoyed by everyone in the St Mary's community. We encourage you to read through some of the projects when they are shared on the digital library.

NATIONAL ARTS AND JAZZ FESTIVALS

For the first time in years, St Mary's, did not send a tour in 2020 to the National Youth Jazz Festival in Makhanda. Sadly, the pandemic again brought dashed hopes for a live festival in 2021. Keeping the spirit of music-making and connection alive, the festival organisers have gone all out to procure a digital festival for a second year running. This was made possible with generous support from Standard Bank.

Alongside recorded performances from around the country, a decision was made this year to still select two national youth bands through a process of recorded auditions. This year, I was invited to participate on several selection panels which met over Zoom to select members of the 2021 National Youth Band and National Schools Band.Jazz educators from around the country came together to decide on the candidates, and two bands of extraordinarily talented young musicians were selected and brought together to rehearse and record.

The youth band worked with award-winning pianist and composer Nduduzo Makhathini and the first-ever small ensemble schools band (usually a big band) were directed by Cape Town-based bass player and educator Shaun Johannes.

To enjoy the products of many jazz artists who are producing work despite the massive challenges Covid-19 has wrought, do buy a ticket to the online 2021 National Arts Jazz Festival:






EUGENE JOUBERT HEAD OF PIANO STUDIES
